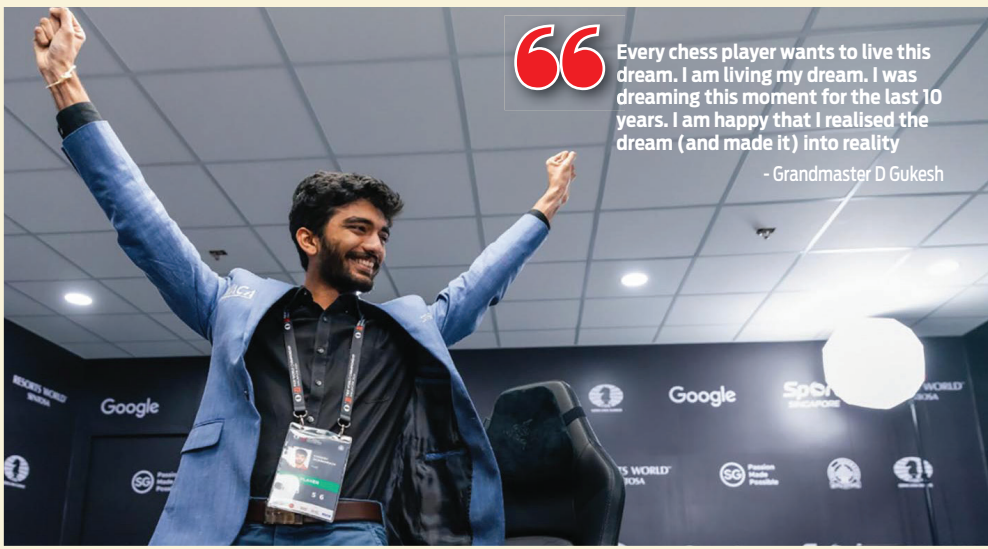

Gukesh beats Ding to be youngest world chess champ at 18

SINGAPORE, 12 DEC

Indian Grandmaster D Gukesh on Thursday became the youngest world chess champion at 18 years after beating title-holder Ding Liren of China in the 14th and last game of a roller-coaster showdown that went right down to the wire.

Gukesh secured the requisite 7.5 points as against 6.5 of Liren after winning the last classical time control game of the 14-game match that seemed headed for a draw for most part. As title winner, he will get a major share of the USD 2.5 million prize purse.

“I was dreaming this moment for the last 10 years. I am happy that I realised the dream (and made it) into reality,” the soft-spoken Chennai-lad told reporters after the

historic triumph here. “Every chess player wants to live this dream. I am living my dream,” said Gukesh. “I got a bit emotional because I was not expecting to win. But then I got a chance to press on,” he added. The triumph was expectedly hailed across India with Prime Minister Narendra Modi hailing it as “historic and exemplary”. “This is the result of his unparalleled talent, hard work and unwavering determination,” Modi posted on X. Before Gukesh’s feat on Thursday, the legendary Garry Kasparov of Russia was the youngest world champion when he won the title at the age of 22, dethroning Anatoly Karpov in 1985. Gukesh had entered the match as the youngest ever challenger to the world crown

after winning the Candidates tournament earlier this year. He is the second Indian after the legendary Viswanathan Anand to win the global title. Anand, a five-time world champion, had last held the title in 2013 before going down to Magnus Carlsen. “Every chess player wants to live this dream. I am living my dream,” said Gukesh. Gukesh, who won the 14th game against Liren after 58 moves in four hours, is the 18th world chess champion overall. If Thursday’s game was also drawn, winner was to be decided in shorter duration tie-breaks on Friday. Gukesh had won the third and 11th rounds before Thursday’s decisive game, while the 32-year-old Liren emerged victorious in the opening and 12th games.

All other games were drawn in the match. “I came here suddenly and I lost the first game itself. Luckily while going back I had Vishy Sir (Anand) in the lift and he said ‘I had only 11 games left you have 13,’” Gukesh recalled. Anand was citing his 2006 first match over Veselin Topalov that he had eventually won after losing the first game. Interestingly, Anand had won that match in the last Classical (12th) game, with black pieces. Anand lost the title to Norwegian maverick Magnus Carlsen back in 2013. Liren, went for a rook trade and Gukesh pawed him almost instantly. He knew that it was his title to lose and it took just three more moves before the Chinese called it a day. —PTI

Harassment alone not abetment to suicide: SC

NEW DELHI, 12 DEC

Mere harassment is not sufficient to hold someone guilty of the offence of abetting suicide, and there must be clear evidence of direct or indirect incitement, the Supreme Court has said. The observations came from a bench of Justices Vikram Nath and PB Varale while delivering a verdict on an appeal challenging a Gujarat High Court order refusing to discharge a woman’s husband and her in-laws for allegedly harassing her and driving her to suicide. The bench said the element of mens rea cannot simply be presumed or inferred and it must be evident and explicitly discernible. The bench said to bring a conviction under Section 306 of the IPC, it was necessary to establish a clear mens rea to instigate or push the deceased to commit suicide. —PTI

KOLKATA, 12 DEC

Senior lawyer Vrinda Grover will no longer be representing the RG Kar Medical College rape-murder victim’s family, sources said on Thursday. The chamber of Grover said in a statement that the concerned trial court, before which the trial in the rape-murder case is being held, has been informed accordingly and that the counsel’s stand discharged from the matter. The body of the on-duty post-graduate trainee doctor was found in the seminar room of RG Kar Medical College and Hospital on 9 August. —PTI

Meitei body urges PM to ban all Kuki militant groups

IMPHAL, 12 DEC

A Delhi-based Meitei organisation urged Prime Minister Narendra Modi to ban all Kuki militant groups in Manipur and to stop alleged appeasement of the Kukis under the name of ‘Suspension of Operations’ (SoO). The SoO pact was signed by the Centre, the Manipur government and two conglomerates of Kuki militant outfits – Kuki National Organisation (KNO) and the United People’s Front (UPF). Delhi Meitei Coordinating Committee also called for protection of territorial integrity of Manipur where ethnic violence between Meiteis and Kukis killed 250 since May last year. —PTI

SC halts surveys, lawsuits in religious places

SC mandated that lower courts refrain from any procedural actions

NEW DELHI, 12 DEC

The Supreme Court of India on Thursday prohibited all courts across the country from entertaining new lawsuits and issuing any interim or final orders in ongoing cases related to the reclamation of religious sites, particularly mosques and dargahs.

The directive came from a bench led by Chief Justice Sanjiv Khanna, which has put a temporary stop to around 18 cases filed by Hindu groups seeking surveys of the original religious status of 10 mosques, including the Gyanvapi Mosque in Varanasi and the Shahi Idgah Masjid in Mathura. The clarity from the court aims to prevent further legal actions pending the Supreme Court’s examination of the constitutional validity of the Places of Worship (Special Provisions) Act, 1991. This Act prohibits any alter-

ation of the religious character of places of worship as they stood on 15 August 1947 and was designed to maintain communal harmony. Notably, the Ram Janmabhoomi-Babri Masjid dispute at Ayodhya is exempt from its provisions.

Supreme Court has given the central government four weeks to file its reply to the various pleas.

During the hearing, various petitions were discussed, including those challenging sections of the 1991 Act that

critics argue limit judicial recourse to reclaim religious sites. The court sought to clarify the legality and reach of the law and mandated that lower courts refrain from any procedural actions, such as surveys, during the ongoing deliberations. Opposing the sweeping order, senior advocate J Sai Deepak argued that parties had not been adequately consulted. However, the Chief Justice emphasised the necessity of the Supreme Court’s oversight in such significant matters, indicating that lower courts should avoid overreach while the higher bench reviews the law’s implications.

The Supreme Court has also requested a response from the central government regarding the pending cases and set a timeline for further submissions, indicating that the matter will be revisited in eight weeks. —PTI

DKS says one must ‘kick the door to get power’; BJP asks ‘you joining us?’

BENGALURU, 12 DEC

Deputy Chief Minister DK Shivakumar’s comments in the Legislative Assembly on Thursday, where he credited astrology for shaping his political journey, sparked a lively debate. He recounted how, during former chief minister SM Krishna’s cabinet, he had to “kick the door” to secure a ministerial post.

The night before the swearing-in ceremony in 1999, after discovering he had been excluded, Shivakumar consulted his astrologer, Dwarakanath. “The astrologer told me that I wouldn’t get the ministerial post eas-

ily,” Shivakumar said. “He advised me that I wouldn’t get a berth unless I ‘kicked and demanded’ it.”

Following this advice, Shivakumar went to Krishna’s residence around 2am and insisted on being included.

Krishna convinced the High Command, and Shivakumar was inducted into the ministry.



The remarks prompted Leader of the Opposition R Ashoka to ask, “From his statements, it’s clear he can’t achieve anything without kicking doors or people. So, whose doors will you kick next to become Chief Minister?” He also mentioned that Shivakumar’s astrologer had predicted he must become Chief Minister by January 2025, or miss the opportunity due to unfavourable stars.

Shivakumar said, “If I reveal what my astrologer told me, over 30 BJP and JD(S) MLAs might switch sides.” Ashoka quickly retorted, “Does that mean you might join BJP?” causing laughter in the assembly. —Salar News

7 naxalites killed in Chhattisgarh encounter

NARAYANPUR, 12 DEC

At least seven Naxal militants were killed during an encounter with security forces in Narayanpur district, Chhattisgarh, on Thursday, according to a senior police official.

The gunfight erupted around 3am in the forests of south Abujhmad as a joint team comprising the police and the Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF) conducted an anti-Naxalite operation.

Following the cessation of gunfire, the bodies of seven Naxalites, all in uniform, were recovered from the scene. —PTI

1 nation, 1 elections gets Cabinet nod

NEW DELHI, 12 DEC

The Union Cabinet on Thursday approved two bills, including one to amend the Constitution to implement “one nation, one election”, and the draft legislations are likely to be introduced in Parliament in the ongoing winter session, sources said.

As of now, the Cabinet has given its nod to draft legislations to hold simultaneous polls to the Lok Sabha and legislative assemblies only, the sources said.

While a high-level committee led by former president Ram Nath Kovind had also proposed holding the municipality and panchayat polls

along with the national and state elections in a phased manner, the Cabinet has decided to stay away, “as of now”, from the manner in which local body elections are conducted. The Constitution amendment bill to hold simultaneous polls will not require ratification by at least 50 per cent of the states, the sources noted. Another Constitution bill proposed was aimed at creating provisions to hold simultaneous elections to municipalities and panchayats, along with the elections to the Lok Sabha and state legislative assemblies, by inserting a new Article 324A. —PTI

11 Panel recommendations for One nation, One elections

- Frequent elections strain the economy; the panel suggests this burden can be alleviated.
- The first phase involves aligning LS, state Assembly, municipal, and panchayat election dates.
- After a general election, the President will notify the date for the LS to convene.
- New state Assemblies will have a short term to align with the next general election date.
- The panel recommends forming a group to oversee the execution of election reforms.
- Introduce Article 324A for simultaneous elections of Panchayats and Municipalities.
- New elections will be called in case of a hung parliament or no-confidence motion.
- Conduct Lok Sabha and state assembly elections simultaneously, in phases.
- If a new LS poll occurs due to a hung parl, the new house will serve the remaining term.
- EC should ensure the procurement of EVMs and VVPATs for efficient election management.
- A unified voter roll and ID system will be implemented for all elections.

ISRO’s CE20 cryogenic engine clears key test

ISRO on Thursday said it has achieved a major milestone after its CE20 cryogenic engine passed a critical test in ambient condition, featuring restart enabling systems.

According to ISRO, this success was a vital step for future missions. “ISRO has successfully carried out the sea level test of its CE20 Cryogenic Engine featuring a nozzle area ratio of 100 at ISRO Propulsion Complex, Mahendragiri, Tamil Nadu on 29 November,” ISRO said. The indigenous CE20 cryo-

genic engine developed by the Liquid Propulsion Systems Centre is powering the upper stage of the Launch Vehicle Mark-3 (LVM-3) and has been qualified to operate at a thrust level of 19 tonne, ISRO explained. “Recently, the engine was qualified for the Gaganyaan mission with a thrust level of 20 tonne and also to an uprated thrust level of 22 tonne for the future C32 stage, towards enhancing the payload capability of LVM3 launch vehicle,” ISRO said. The performance of a multi-element igniter that is required for engine restart capability

was also demonstrated during this test.

ISRO said that the main concern during testing at sea level included flow separation inside the nozzle, which leads to severe vibrations and thermal problems at the flow separation plane leading to possible mechanical damage of the nozzle.

In order to mitigate this issue, the flight acceptance tests for CE20 engines are currently being performed at the High-Altitude Test facility, thereby adding complexity to the acceptance testing procedure, it added. —PTI

Minor, father booked over stunts on scooter

BENGALURU, 12 DEC

A minor boy and his father have been booked under the Juvenile Justice (JJ) Act after the traffic police caught the boy performing stunts on a scooter in Pulikeshi Nagar. The incident occurred during a random vehicle check conducted by officials from Pulikeshi Nagar and Banaswadi traffic police stations on Wednesday. The boy was found engaging in wheelies and other stunts, causing a nuisance on the road. Upon confirming that he was underage, the police seized the scooter and filed an FIR against both the boy and his father, who is the registered owner of the vehicle. Deputy Commissioner of Police, Traffic, East, Kuldeep Kumar Jain stated that underage driving offenses hold both the minor and their parent or guardian accountable. "The penalty can go up to Rs 25,000, and the guardian could face up to three years of imprisonment," he said. —Salar News

BJP MLAs barge into Speaker's chamber

Confrontation came amid debate over lathicharge on Panchamasali protesters in Belagavi

BELAGAVI, 12 DEC

Tensions flared in the Assembly on Thursday as BJP MLAs barged into Speaker UT Khader's chamber, expressing strong objections to his handling of the proceedings. The confrontation came amidst heated debates over the recent police lathi charge on Panchamasali Lingayat protesters, with the ruling Congress and Opposition BJP trading accusations.

The issue arose when Congress MLA Vijayanand Kashappanavar, himself a leader of the Panchamasali Lingayat community, criticized the decision of previous BJP government to scrap the 4 per cent Muslim reservation and reallocate it equally between the Lingayat and Vokkaliga communities.

He alleged that the BJP government, under Basavaraj Bommai, had backtracked on its decision by assuring the Supreme Court it would not implement the reservation

changes. BJP members objected, insisting that the discussion focus solely on the police action during Tuesday's protests near Suvarna Vidhana Soudha, where the Panchamasali Lingayat community demanded inclusion in the 2A category of the OBC reservation matrix (15 per cent), as opposed to the cur-

rent 3B category (5 per cent). The protests turned violent earlier this week, with stone pelting from demonstrators and subsequent lathi charges by police. During the Assembly debate, Kashappanavar accused the BJP of misleading the community and the Panchamasali seer, alleging that the protest was "sponsored and instigat-

ed" by the party. He also claimed RSS members were involved in the stone pelting, sparking a heated exchange between BJP and Congress MLAs.

The situation escalated when Speaker Khader allowed Revenue Minister Krishna Byre Gowda to speak after Home Minister G Parameashwara had already addressed the lathi charge issue. BJP MLAs argued that their voices should have been heard first. Gowda criticized the saffron party, blaming its past policies for the "injustice" faced by the Panchamasali Lingayat community, citing the BJP's affidavit to the Supreme Court on reservation issues.

Angered by Gowda's statement, BJP MLA Sunil Kumar raised a point of order, questioning why the Minister was permitted to speak.

The Speaker dismissed the objection, prompting BJP members to raise slogans and tear papers in protest —PTI

Govt taking steps to control atrocities against women, minor girls: Minister

Home Minister G Parameashwara on Thursday said the government is "actively working" to control atrocities against women and minor girls in the State. He also mentioned that five lakh cameras have been installed across the State to prevent crime. Responding to a question by S Ravi in Legislative Council, Parameashwara said the state government is taking cases of "atrocities against women and minor girls seriously". —PTI

MLC flays BJP for backing agitators

Former minister and MLC H Vishwanath on Thursday condemned the State BJP leaders for extending support to Panchamasali Lingayat community who are holding agitation against the state government seeking inclusion of community under 2 A category. Speaking to reporters at a press conference, he also criticised the Panchamasali Seer Basava Mrtyunjaywamy for taking part in the agitation and dividing rift in the society. He also said that Panchamasalis were already enjoying reservation under backward classes category 3B. —Salar News

MBBS student dies as bike collides with goods auto

MYSURU, 12 DEC

A Kerala-based MBBS student was killed when he the scooter he was riding along with his friend collided against a goods auto on National Highway near Hirikate gate in Gundlupet taluk on Wednesday. According to police, the deceased has been identified as Mohammed Farhan Habib, 22. The incident took place when they were heading towards Waynad. The other individual sustained minor injuries. —Salar News

Bengaluru to have cloudy sky with rains today: IMD

BENGALURU, 12 DEC

Rains lashed Bengaluru and parts of the south interior and coastal districts of Karnataka on Thursday, causing traffic congestion in the state capital.

However, Bengaluru city and its neighbourhood areas are likely to witness a generally cloudy sky with moderate rain likely in some areas on Friday, the India Meteorological Department (IMD) said.

In a statement, the IMD attributed the weather to a well-marked low pressure area over the Gulf of Mannar and neighbourhood, with the associated upper air cyclonic circulation extending up to mid-troposphere levels persisting.

The system is very likely to continue to move west-northwest towards south Tamil Nadu and weaken gradually during the next 12 hours, it said.

According to the IMD, light to moderate rain occurred at isolated places over Dakshina Kannada, Udupi districts and at many districts of south interior Karnataka.

Isolated heavy rain is likely to occur over Mandya, Kolar Chikkaballapura, Tumkur, Mysuru, Bengaluru Rural and Bengaluru Urban districts, but dry weather is very likely to prevail over Uttara Kannada and north interior Karnataka areas till December 13. —PTI

Police have arrested two Nepali citizens on Thursday for Sunday's killing of two men in Yelahanka following an altercation allegedly over messaging and video calling a woman.

The victims, Vikram Singh, 21, a Nepal citizen working as a security guard, and Chhoto Toori, 33, who hailed from Bihar, were found dead with

multiple injuries near a chemical factory where Singh worked, police said.

WOMAN ASSAULTS LOVER'S WIFE

Two separate incidents registered in Narasimharaja police station where one case is of assault and another of attempted sexual assault in the city.

The first case involves Santosh Kumar, a resident of Lingadheerahalli Layout, Bengaluru, and his lover Shilpa, who allegedly assault-

ed his wife, Shwetha, and their daughter for questioning his extramarital affair. In a second case, Amanulla Khan, a house owner in Mysuru, has been accused of attempting to sexually assault a medical student from Kerala. The student had been staying in Khan's house since June. —Salar News

JILTED LOVER KILLS WOMAN, ENDS LIFE

A security guard allegedly murdered a 26-year-old woman and later took his own life by hanging himself from a tree near Nallurahalli Lake in the City. The Marathahalli police identified the two deceased as Mithun Mondal and Ooha Mondal, both originally from

West Bengal. According to police, Mithun had been pressuring Ooha to enter into a relationship with him and leave her husband. She rejected his repeated advances. On Wednesday evening, Mithun allegedly attacked her with a dagger. —Salar News

Mother ends life after killing two children

A 36-year-old woman allegedly took her own life after strangling her two young children at an apartment in Kodigehalli. Police suspect that a marital dispute may have driven her to take the extreme step. The incident, which came to light on Wednesday night, involved Kusuma, her six-year-old son Shreyan, and her two-year-old daughter Sharvi. The Deputy Commissioner of Police (DCP), Bengaluru North-East, confirmed the details to Salar News.

The incident was discovered when her husband Suresh returned home and found the lifeless bodies of his wife and children.

Police recovered a death note, purportedly written by Kusuma, which stated, "We are solely responsible for our deaths." —Salar News

UP COPS IN THE DARK

Techie's suicide: Wife's mother and brother flee

JAUNPUR, 12 DEC

The mother-in-law and the brother-in-law of techie Atul Subhash, who committed suicide in Bengaluru, fled their home in Jaunpur on Thursday, even as Uttar Pradesh Police said it was yet to receive any official communication from Karnataka.

The 34-year-old techie ended his life on Monday in Bengaluru, alleging harassment at the hands of his estranged wife and her family. A case of abetment to suicide was registered against his wife Nikita Singhania, her mother Nisha, father Anurag and uncle Sushil.

Around 1 am, Nisha Singhania and her son Anurag alias Piyush Singhania left their home in the Khowa Mandi area of Jaunpur on a motorcycle and have since not returned, a police official said.

Purported video clips on social media also showed them leaving the home around midnight.

"We are yet to receive any official communication from the Bengaluru Police over this

case," said Jaunpur Superintendent of Police Ajaypal Sharma.

He said there was a routine-level of police deployment in the Khowa Mandi area as required for law and order maintenance.

In her complaint, Nikita mentioned that she married Subhash on 26 April, 2019 and that her husband and in-laws were unhappy with the wedding gifts from her parents. They demanded an additional Rs10 lakh. "They started torturing me physically and mentally for dowry. When I told my parents about the harassment and dowry, my parents told me that everything will be fine. But no improvement of any kind came in my husband and in-laws," Nikita said. —PTI

UTTARAHALLI ROAD TO HAVE TRAFFIC CURBS TODAY

Vehicular traffic will be blocked on the Uttarahalli Main Road between 11.30am and 1pm to facilitate Golden Chariot procession organised by the Veeranjaneya Temple on Friday, the Bengaluru traffic police (BTP) said.

Three die in separate road accidents in City

BENGALURU, 12 DEC

Three lives were tragically lost in two separate road accidents reported in the city on Thursday, highlighting ongoing traffic safety concerns. In the first incident, a 24-year-old software engineer, Kumar Kurakula, was fatally crushed by a tipper truck near the SJ Park junction while riding from KR Market to his home in Marathahalli.

The accident occurred at around 12.55am, according to Halasuru Gate traffic police. In the second incident, two individuals were killed in a collision between a canter truck, carrying chicken, and a tipper truck near the Ayurvedic hospital in Nallurahalli. The victims have been identified as Lakshmi Narayana, 30, a canter truck driver from Andhra Pradesh; and his assistant, Moin Zohid, 22, a resident of Manipur. —Salar News

State achieves over 9% GSDP growth

BENGALURU, 12 DEC

India's states have demonstrated remarkable economic resilience in the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic, with 25 states achieving over 7 per cent growth in their Gross State Domestic Product (GSDP) during FY22 and FY23, according to a report by the PHD Chamber of Commerce and Industry (PHDCCI).

Among these, 17 states surpassed an impressive 9 per cent growth rate, with Karnataka, Gujarat, Kerala, Telangana, Rajasthan, West Bengal, Bihar, Uttar Pradesh, Haryana, and Odisha standing out for their robust economic performance during 2021-22 and 2022-23.

Gujarat, and Karnataka have excelled in industrial and technological advancements, contributing significantly to the nation's GDP.

Tourism-centric states such as Kerala, Rajasthan, and Goa have capitalized on India's rich cultural heritage, boosting foreign exchange earnings and supporting the economy.

Infrastructure development and sustainability have been key focus areas in recent years. Tamil Nadu and Andhra Pradesh have made substantial progress in infrastructure projects, while Rajasthan and Gujarat have taken the lead in renewable energy initiatives, aligning with India's sustainable development goals. —ANI

MLA Prabhu, representing the Aurad assembly constituency in Kalyan Karnataka, engaged with the Shiv Sainiks

in Marathi, which helped diffuse the situation and led to reasoned debate. The Shiv Sena responded after Karnataka had barred the Maharashtra Ekikaran Samiti (MES), a pro-Maharashtrian organisation in Karnataka, from holding a convention protesting the assembly session in Belagavi. Politicians were also blocked from attending the inaugural convention on 9 December. —Salar News

Punjab: Dallewal's fast-unto-death enters day 17

CHANDIGARH, 12 DEC
Punjab farmer leader Jagjit Singh Dallewal, whose fast-unto-death entered seven-teenth day on Thursday, wrote a letter to Prime Minister Narendra Modi, saying that ensuring minimum support price to every farmer is like the fundamental right to live. Dallewal has been on a fast-unto-death at the Khanauri border since 26 November to press the Centre to accept demands including a legal guarantee to the MSP on crops. Meanwhile, Samyukta Kisan Morcha leaders Rakesh Tikait and Harinder Singh Lakhowal will visit the Khanauri border to meet Dallewal on Friday, Punjab Assembly Speaker. —PTI

Three Prepak-Pro cadres arrested in Manipur

IMPHAL, DEC 12
Police in Manipur's Thoubal district arrested three members of the banned militant outfit, the People's Revolutionary Party of Kangleipak (Prepak-Pro), on Wednesday. The trio was apprehended during a coordinated effort by the Commando Unit Thoubal and the Assam Rifles, following reports of their presence in the Thoubal Athokpam area. The arrested individuals have been identified as Nambam Indrajit Singh, Rajkumar Mohan Sana, and Warepam Albert Meitei Thoi. In their possession, authorities discovered a grenade, demand letters associated with Prepak-Pro, three mobile phones, and a motorcycle. In a related operation, security forces in the Churachandpur districts recovered ten firearms and a substantial cache of ammunition. —PTI

Delhi polls: Poster war intensifies among parties

NEW DELHI, 12 DEC
In the run-up to the Delhi Assembly polls, streets and public places in the national capital are awash with campaign posters as political parties vie for the voters' attention. The ruling AAP and its closest rival, BJP, dominate the poster war, sending across political messages like "Phir Layenge Kejriwal" to "Ab Nahi Sahenge, Badal Ke Rahenge" and putting up banners at vantage points like billboards, main roads, residential colonies, walkways and marketplaces across the city. Meanwhile, AAP supremo Arvind Kejriwal on Thursday announced the launch of the Mukhya Mantri Mahila Samman Yojna to give a monthly assistance of Rs 1,000 to women in Delhi, and promised the amount would be raised to Rs 2,100 after the elections. —PTI



Stalin, Vijayan push for anti discrimination fight

KOTTAYAM, 12 DEC
Kerala Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan and his Tamil Nadu counterpart M K Stalin on Thursday highlighted the spirit of unity demonstrated by leaders like 'Periyar' E V Ramasamy in abolishing the discrimination that prevailed in society a century ago and called for the continuation of that struggle against the differences existing in the modern era. Both chief ministers spoke at a public meeting held at Vaikom Beach in this district after inaugurating the renovated Thanthai Periyar Memorial and Periyar Library, established in honour of Dravidar Kazhagam founder E V Ramasamy. Stalin inaugurated the memorial and library in the presence of Vijayan to commemorate the culmination of the centenary of the Vaikom Satyagraha (1924-25), which was fought for the rights of lower castes to access roads leading to the famous Mahadeva Temple. —PTI

Country not equipped for simultaneous polls: Oppn

NEW DELHI, 12 DEC

Opposition parties on Thursday raised concerns over bills cleared by the government for holding simultaneous elections and said larger consultations are required, even as ruling NDA leaders asserted the burden on the exchequer will be lessened. The Union Cabinet had approved bills to implement One Nation, One Election, and sources said the draft legislations are likely to be introduced in Parliament in the ongoing Winter Session. Opposition MPs questioned if the country is logistically ready to hold simultaneous elections, pointing out that

recent polls in Maharashtra and Jharkhand could not be held together with that in Haryana and Jammu and Kashmir. Minister of State for Agriculture Bhagirath Chaudhary welcomed the move and said, "One Nation, One Election will be good for the nation. It will help in saving people's money." He also dismissed the reservations expressed by opposition, and said, "They are in a habit of opposing everything." BJP's ally Lok Janshakti Party (RV) MP Shambhavi Choudhary also welcomed the move. "This is an ambitious bill, LJP has supported

it... Every six months, there is an election in some state, and leaders focus on that. Many times, representatives are also not able to give time in Parliament. Resources are wasted," she said. "One Nation, One Election sounds good, if the nation can go in that direction, nothing like it. But what is the reality? Is the Election Commission ready for it? Do we have enough forces, infrastructure?" Shiv Sena (UBT) MP Anil Desai asked. "J&K, and Haryana elections could have been held together with Maharashtra but it was not done. Even the Jharkhand election was held in two phases... If government has some solution, it can be discussed. But in the present situation, it does not appear they can do it," Desai said. Congress Lok Sabha mem-

ber K Suresh said, "Our party has already cleared our stand from the beginning... We are opposing it. Entire opposition is opposing it," he said. CPI(M) Rajya Sabha member John Brittas said, "One nation, one election, is part of their slogan 'one leader, one country, one ideology, one language...' It's against the federal spirit of the country." —PTI

Ex-YSRCP minister Avanti quits; flags lack of respect

AMARAVATI, 12 DEC

M Srinivasa Rao, commonly known as Avanti Srinivas, a senior leader of the YSR Congress Party (YSRCP) and former Andhra Pradesh minister, has announced his resignation from the party, citing 'personal reasons.' In his resignation letter to party chief YS Jagan Mohan Reddy, Rao expressed his dissatisfaction with the lack of respect for party functionaries and cadres within the organisation. In addition to resigning from the YSRCP, Rao has also stepped down from his role overseeing the party's affairs in the Bheemili Assembly constituency. He has thanked the former chief minister for the opportunities he received during his time in politics. Rao, an education tycoon, voiced concerns over the treatment of YSRCP leaders and activists over the past five years, indicating that they have suffered vastly. He strongly opposed the suggestion for party members to initiate protests against the TDP-led National Democratic Alliance government less than a year after the recent Assembly elections. Rao stated that any political organisation should operate democratically rather than unilaterally. The YSRCP faced a significant defeat in the 13 May elections, which resulted in N Chandrababu Naidu's return to power, further highlighting the challenges the party now faces. —PTI

RS, LS adjourned amid ruckus

TMC's Kalyan says sorry to Scindia; LS to begin 2-day Constitution debate today

NEW DELHI, 12 DEC

Rajya Sabha and Lok Sabha again faced adjournments today amid uproar over the BJP alleging Congress' links with US hedge fund tycoon George Soros.

The Lok Sabha will on Friday begin a two-day debate on the Constitution to mark the beginning of the 75th year of its adoption in the country.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi is expected to reply to the two-day debate on the Constitution in the Lok Sabha on Saturday, sources said.

Defence Minister Rajnath Singh will initiate the debate on the Constitution in the Lok Sabha, while Union Home Minister Amit Shah is expected to initiate a similar debate in the Rajya Sabha, said government sources.

Rajya Sabha proceedings were adjourned as the members of the treasury and opposition benches traded charges over a no-trust motion brought against Chairman Jagdeep Dhankhar and the BJP's allegations of the Congress leadership's "links" with billionaire investor George Soros.

The Upper House has been witnessing a ruckus as the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) has been alleging links between the Congress and Soros, and has also slammed the Opposition for moving the motion against Dhankhar.

Kalyan Banerjee submits written apology for remarks against Scindia

Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla on Thursday said that TMC MP Kalyan Banerjee has submitted a written apology for his remarks against Union Minister Jyotiraditya Scindia besides apologising. As soon as the House met, some members belonging to the ruling alliance stood up to raise the issue of the remarks made by Banerjee.

However, Birla intervened and said whatever happened on Wednesday was unfortunate and no member should make any personal remark against any fellow member.

Without taking the name of Banerjee, he said any remark against women is in bad taste and it hurts their dignity and honour. —PTI

Gadkari on accidents: Feel ashamed abroad

"When I go to attend international conferences where there is a discussion on road accidents, I try to hide my face," Nitin Gadkari said on Thursday, underlining he had set a target to reduce accidents by 50 per cent when he first took charge as the Road Transport and Highways Minister.

TMC's Ghose moves privilege motion against Rijiju

NEW DELHI, 12 DEC

Trinamool Congress' Rajya Sabha MP Sagarika Ghose on Thursday submitted a privilege motion notice against Parliamentary Affairs Minister Kiren Rijiju for making a derogatory remark against opposition leaders in the Upper House.

The notice has been signed by 60 leaders from Opposition parties, a source said.

"Yesterday in the house, addressing the opposition, Rijiju said you all are not worthy of being in this house... The Minister for Parliamentary Affairs, Kiren Rijiju, instead of doing his best to run Parliament smoothly, has chosen to repeatedly insult the opposition," Ghose told reporters.

She said she had moved a privilege motion against Rijiju for abusing his office with his "diatribes and unparliamentary language." —PTI

Bharatiya Vayuyan Vidheyak was cleared by the Parliament this month. An Act to provide for regulation and control of the design, manufacture, maintenance, possession, use, operation, sale, export and import of aircraft and for matters therewith or incidental thereto."

Over 1,300 posts vacant in IAS, 586 in IPS

There are 1,316 and 586 vacant posts of Indian Administrative Service (IAS) and Indian Police Service (IPS) officers, Union Minister Jitendra Singh said on Thursday. Of the total sanctioned strength of 6,858 IAS, there were 5,542 officers in-position, as on 1 January, 2024, he said in a written reply to the Rajya Sabha. Of the 1,316 vacant posts of IAS, 794 were meant for direct recruit.

BJP's ministerial list ready: Fadnavis

NEW DELHI, 12 DEC

Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis announced that the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) has short-listed potential ministers for his cabinet, with the final selections pending approval from the party's central leadership. Fadnavis made the remark during a two-day visit to Delhi, where he held discussions with senior party figures including Union Home Minister Amit Shah, BJP president JP Nadda, and senior leader BL Santosh.

While the precise date for the cabinet expansion remains undecided, Fadnavis indicated that a formula has been established, promising further details will be revealed shortly. In a separate state-

ment, Nationalist Congress Party (NCP) chief Ajit Pawar speculated that cabinet expansion could occur as soon as 14 December.

The BJP-led Mahayuti coalition secured a decisive victory in last month's Maharashtra Assembly elections, winning

230 seats, while the opposition Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA) managed just 46 seats in the 288-member Assembly. Alongside Fadnavis, Shiv Sena chief Eknath Shinde and Ajit Pawar were sworn in as deputy chief ministers in a ceremony attended by Prime Minister Narendra Modi and numerous leaders from various sectors.

Fadnavis dismissed reports of discord within the ruling alliance regarding power-sharing agreements, stating there were no issues hindering cabinet expansion. He clarified that Shinde and Pawar would individually decide on their respective ministers, emphasising that his discussions in Delhi were focused on identifying candidates from the BJP. —PTI

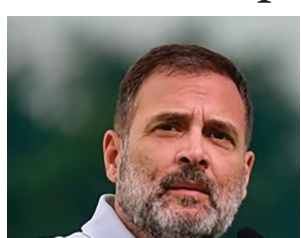
Rahul visits Hathras rape victim's kin

HATHRAS, 12 DEC

Leader of Opposition in the Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi on Thursday met the family of a Dalit woman in Hathras who died allegedly after being gang-raped in September 2020.

The Congress MP reached Bool Garhi village around 11.15 am, even as police stepped up deployment in and around the hamlet in the Chandpa area of the district in light of his visit.

Gandhi spent around 35 minutes with the family at their home and interacted with them. He left without speaking to a group of reporters who had gathered

in the village to cover his visit. After Gandhi left, Congress' former Hathras chief Chandragupta Vikramaditya said, "Rahul Gandhi has a relation with this family. He has always stood with them and will continue to do so." Last month, Gandhi tried

to visit violence-hit Sambhal district to meet the victim families but was stopped by the state government citing prohibition on the entry of outsiders, including public representatives, till 10 December for law and order reasons.

Uttar Pradesh Deputy Chief Minister Brajesh Pathak, however, criticised Gandhi for the visit, saying he is not aware of the status of the case. "The CBI has already conducted an inquiry into this case. Under the BJP rule, no culprit is allowed to get away scot free," he said. "Whether Sambhal or Hathras, he (Gandhi) keeps visiting just to be in limelight." —PTI

'BANANA REPUBLIC'

Oppn slams Assam govt over NRC-Aadhaar link

GUWAHATI, 12 DEC

Opposition Congress and Trinamool Congress on Thursday criticised the Assam government's decision to make NRC application a pre-condition for obtaining an Aadhaar card, stating the state has turned "banana republic" under CM Himanta Biswa Sarma and BJP.

In an effort to link the Aadhaar card with the National Register of Citizens (NRC), the Assam government on Wednesday decided that all applications for the unique identity card will be rejected if the applicant or their family had not applied for the NRC.

The decision was taken in view of infiltration attempts by citizens of trouble-hit Bangladesh, Sarma said.

TMC Rajya Sabha MP Sushmita Dev, who hails from Assam, said the NRC has not been notified by the Registrar General of India to date, and questioned making it the basis.

"Secondly, even non-citizens in India get AADHAR cards if they have stayed 182 days in the 12 months before applying. Lastly, unless the government declares a person an illegal migrant, how can they refuse AADHAR? Assam is a banana republic under @himantabiswa & @BJP4India," she posted on X. —PTI

Need time for lasting calm in Manipur: CM

IMPHAL, 12 DEC

Manipur Chief Minister N Biren Singh on Thursday said the Centre and the state governments are making all efforts to bring a permanent solution to the ongoing crisis in the state, but it could take time because of the fragile nature of the situation.

Speaking at a programme to commemorate Nupi Lan, Singh said, "The state and central governments have been putting all efforts to bring a permanent solution. However, bringing a solution would take time as the situation had become chronic and fragile." Regarding the re-imposition

of Armed Forces Special Powers Act (AFSPA) in six police station areas, Biren said, "The state government had requested the Centre to review and withdraw AFSPA from the said police stations" and sought cooperation and support from the public in the government's effort to restore peace in the state.

"We should also remember the bravery and courage shown by Manipuri women in other instances, including ousting the Burmese during the Seven-Year Devastation period (1819-1826)," Singh said, adding that the same could also be seen among the present-day women of the state. —PTI

Soldier shoots himself dead in J&K's Rajouri

JAMMU, 12 DEC
In an apparent case of suicide, an Army personnel allegedly shot himself dead using his service rifle in the Rajouri district of Jammu and Kashmir, officials said. Havaladar Indesh Kumar was on sentry duty inside his camp at the Anjanwali village in the Manjakote area when he fatally shot himself late Tuesday, the officials said. They said the reason behind the extreme step was not known immediately. Police have started inquest proceedings into the case, the officials added. —PTI

Odisha: Pregnant woman shot dead by miscreants

BHUBANESWAR, 12 DEC
A pregnant woman was shot dead by two unidentified persons in Odisha's Sundargarh district, police said. The deceased was identified as Soumyamayee Behera, wife of Deben Behera of Jhirdapali village under Tikayatpali police station in the district. She was seven months pregnant, they added. According to preliminary investigation, two unidentified persons knocked on Soumyamayee's door late on Tuesday night. When she opened the door, they snatched her gold ornaments and shot her when she raised an alarm, a police officer said. A forensic team and dog squad have been sent to the crime spot, and further investigation is ongoing to nab the accused, the police officer said. —PTI

No alcohol songs: C'garh's rule for Diljit's concert

CHANDIGARH, 12 DEC
Chandigarh Commission for Protection of Child Rights (CCPCR) has advised singer-actor Diljit Dosanjh, set to perform here on Saturday, to refrain from singing alcohol-themed songs during his live show, citing their adverse impact on children of impressionable age. The advisory issued by the CCPCR chairperson Shipra Bansal on Thursday, specifically mentioned songs like 'Patiala Peg', '5 Tara', and 'Case' etc, cautioning against even altered versions that promote alcohol, drugs or violence. "Avoid performing the songs i.e. Patiala Peg, 5 Tara, Case etc, even with twisted words in which alcohol, drugs and violence are promoted. These songs affect the children of impressionable age," the advisory read. This follows a similar directive issued last month by the Telangana government during Dosanjh's live show in Hyderabad, where he was advised against promoting alcohol and drugs. —PTI



5-yr-old boy who fell into borewell dies in Rajasthan

JAIPUR, 12 DEC
Five-year-old Aryan, who fell into a 150-foot-deep borewell in Rajasthan's Dausa, lost the battle for life. He was taken out of the borewell last night after more than 55-hour-long rescue operation and was rushed to a hospital in an unconscious state, where doctors declared him dead. The incident occurred in the Kalikah village at around 3 pm on Monday and the rescue operation began an hour later. Aryan was playing at a farm and accidentally fell into the borewell in front of her mother. As soon as the rescue team reached there, oxygen supply was started through a pipe and a camera was placed to capture his movement. National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) personnel said there were myriad challenges in the operation - the water level in the area was around 160 feet, capturing any movement of the child on camera was difficult, and there were safety concerns for the staff as well. —PTI

Mere harassment no proof of suicide abetment: SC

Judgment's relevance increases after suicide of Bengaluru techie Atul Subhash

NEW DELHI, 12 DEC

Mere harassment is not sufficient to hold someone guilty of the offence of abetting suicide, and there must be clear evidence of direct or indirect incitement, the Supreme Court has said.

The observations came from a bench of Justices Vikram Nath and PB Varale while delivering a verdict on an appeal challenging a Gujarat High Court order refusing to discharge a woman's husband and her in-laws for allegedly harassing her and driving her to suicide.

The observations in the judgement gain significance in the wake of the recent suicidal death case of 34-year-old techie Atul Subhash. He alleged harassment at the

hands of his estranged wife and her family.

A case of abetment of suicide was registered against his wife Nikita Singhania, her mother Nisha, father Anurag

and uncle Sushil.

The top court's observations may come to the aid of Nisha and her family members. It said the prosecution must

demonstrate an active or direct action by the accused that led the deceased to take his or her own life.

The bench said the element of mens rea cannot simply be presumed or inferred and it must be evident and explicitly discernible.

The bench noted the woman got married in 2009 and for the first five years of the wedlock,

no child was born to the couple due to which she was allegedly subjected to physical and mental harassment.

The bench said to bring a conviction under Section 306 of the IPC, it was necessary to establish a clear mens rea to instigate or push the deceased to commit suicide.

The top court said in cases of alleged abetment of suicide, there must be concrete proof of either direct or indirect acts of incitement that led to the suicide.

"Mere allegations of harassment are insufficient to establish guilt. For a conviction, there must be evidence of a positive act by the accused, closely linked to the time of the incident, that compelled or drove the victim to commit suicide," it said. —PTI

'ED cannot dictate public prosecutors'

NEW DELHI, 12 DEC

Supreme Court has said the Enforcement Directorate and its director may provide instructions related to the facts of a money laundering case but they cannot direct their prosecutors on how to conduct themselves in court.

The top court ruling underscored the independence of public prosecutors as officers of the court and limits the influence of investigative agencies in judicial proceedings. It clarified the limits of the ED's authority over public prosecutors while addressing a trial court's directive. —PTI

DESECRATION OF CONSTITUTION

Parbhani violence: Prohibitory orders remain, 50 detained

CHHATRAPATI SAMBHAJINAGAR, 12 DEC

An uneasy calm prevailed in Parbhani on Thursday with police detaining around 50 people for the violent protests that rocked the central Maharashtra city over vandalising of a replica of the Constitution.

Some 20 vehicles were damaged during Wednesday's protests, police said.

The situation was under control, Parbhani collector Raghunath Gawade told PTI Videos.

Six teams have been formed to prepare 'panchnamas' (inspection reports) of the damage to private property, he said, adding that police were investigating if there was any political motive behind the violence.

Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnis on Thursday said the government promptly made an arrest and the accused, who allegedly damaged the replica, was a mentally unstable man. —PTI

Sambhal Kotwali Station House Officer (SHO) Anuj Kumar Tomar said, "Case was filed by Naseem, son of Shareef, at Moradabad's Pakbara station and was transferred to Sambhal. —PTI

Lawyer Vrinda steps down from RG Kar case

KOLKATA, 12 DEC

Senior lawyer Vrinda Grover will no longer be representing the RG Kar Medical College rape-murder victim's family, sources said on Thursday.

The chamber of Grover said in a statement that the concerned trial court, before which the trial in the rape-murder case is being held, has been informed accordingly and that the counsels stand discharged from the matter.

It said that at this stage, on account of "certain intervening factors and circumstances", senior lawyer Vrinda Grover is "constrained to withdraw from the case proceedings in this matter" and will no longer be representing the victim's family.

The chamber of advocate Grover, including advocates Soutik Banerjee and Arjun Gopu, had been requested by the victim's parents to provide legal representation before the Supreme Court, Calcutta High Court and the Sealadah sessions court and ACJM court, the sources said.

Grover's chamber provided

legal services and representation pro bono (free of cost) to the victim's family before all courts from September 2024, they said.

It said that during this period, the evidence of 43 prosecution witnesses has been recorded, and "bail of other accused persons consistently and successfully opposed.

The body of the on-duty post-graduate trainee doctor was found in the seminar room of RG Kar Medical College and Hospital on 9 August. Post mortem of the body revealed that she was raped and brutally murdered. —PTI

Delhi HC junks PIL on sexual harassment in film industry

NEW DELHI, 12 DEC

The Delhi High Court on Thursday refused to examine a PIL raising allegations of sexual harassment in the "Indian film industry".

A bench of Acting Chief Justice Vibhu Bakhru and Justice Tushar Rao Gedela said that in the absence of a complaint by an aggrieved party, it couldn't order a "roving and fishing" inquiry.

The petitioner, who relied on the Justice Hema Committee report on sexual exploitation in the Malayalam film industry, sought a direction to the National Commission for Women to inquire into the alleged violation of fundamental and human rights in the Indian film industry as well.

"We will examine when there is a complaint. Your petition is structured on the report of Justice Hema Committee which is being looked into by another court," the bench said, adding, "We will not direct any roving and fishing inquiry." —PTI

The petitioner, Ajeesh Kalathil Gopi, alleged that sexual harassment was present in the "entire film industry" and said he has even made complaint to relevant authorities in this regard. He also sought the report of the committee to be produced verbatim to ensure transparency.

The court, however, said the complaint should come from a survivor and noted the "entire petition was based on surmises without any empirical data". It said Justice Hema Committee was constituted after complaints were made by aggrieved parties. —PTI

MP owner bites 'Pushpa 2' viewer's ear over food bill

GWALIOR, 12 DEC

A canteen owner at a theatre screening the movie 'Pushpa 2: The Rule' in Madhya Pradesh's Gwalior allegedly bit the ear of a man over a dispute on settling the snacks bill, police said.

The incident took place on Sunday when the victim, Shabbir, went to the canteen of Kailash Talkies in Inderganj area during the movie interval to buy food, the police said on Wednesday.

An argument broke out between Shabbir and canteen owner Raju, who accused the former of not paying money, an official said.

The heated exchange escalated into a fight with Raju and his three associates thrashing Shabbir. Raju allegedly bit one of the ears of Shabbir, as per the FIR. —PTI

Rains lash TN; schools closed in many districts

CHENNAI, 12 DEC

Widespread rains lashed parts of Tamil Nadu on Thursday, prompting authorities to declare a holiday for schools in Chennai and many other districts.

With the water-level fast rising in the reservoirs in the state, the Public Works Department officials opened the shutters of two dams in Chennai suburbs and another in Thiruvannamalai district.

About 13,000 cusecs water was released from Sathanur dam in Thiruvannamalai, while 3,500 cusecs water from Chembarambakkam dam, and another 1,000 cusecs water was discharged from the Poondi reservoir, as the level of water in these dams dangerously inched towards the full reservoir capacity levels.

Following the heavy rainfall warning issued by the IMD, six NDRF teams have been alerted to swing into rescue and relief activity in case of emergency, the government said. It also urged the people in the low-lying areas in the state to remain vigilant and take appropriate action.

In a purported social media post, Godara said, "I, Rohit Godara, Bikaner, Goldy Brar, have caused the bomb blasts outside two clubs in Chandigarh and in Sector 29 of Gurugram two days ago." "Gambling bookies, hawala traders and dance clubs who are earning crores of rupees daily will all have to pay tax. This is just a small demo to open your ears. We can create an even bigger explosion which will disintegrate such dance clubs."

He threatened the operators: "Don't take this as our warning, we do what we say. Those who suck the blood of the poor and those who earn crores of rupees, will have to pay." —PTI

Kerala HC criticises Dileep's Sabarimala VIP darshan

KOCHI, 12 DEC

Kerala High Court on Thursday termed as "very very serious" the "VIP darshan" provided to actor Dileep at the Lord Ayyappa shrine in Sabarimala recently and said that it resulted in pilgrims being "virtually blocked" from getting darshan of the deity for several minutes.

A bench of Justices Anil K Narendran and Muralee Krishna S said it was "not a question of two minutes" when the first two rows in front of the 'Sopanam' were "choked" for several minutes to allow the actor to get darshan.

"What is the privilege such persons are having?" the court asked and directed the Travancore Devaswom Board (TDB) and the Chief Police Coordinator to ensure such things do not happen in future.

UP scientist's minor son kills mom

GORAKHPUR, 12 DEC

A scientist's minor son has allegedly confessed to killing his mother at their home in Gorakhpur, days after he misled his father and police, claiming she died of an accidental fall, officials said.

Aarti Verma died after her son, a class 11 student, pushed her and her head crashed against a wall on 3 December, police said.

Superintendent of Police (North) Jitendra Kumar Srivastava said, "After two hours of questioning, the teenager admitted that he pushed his mother during an argument, leading to a fatal head injury."

When Aarti's husband Ram Milan, an assistant scientist at the Bhabha Atomic Research Centre in Chennai, found her phone switched off for two

days, he sent his sister-in-law on 7 December to check the house.

The house was found locked from outside. On returning to Gorakhpur the following evening, Milan found his wife's body on the floor, police said.

Investigators found bloodstains at two different spots, indicating that the body was dragged. CCTV footage also confirmed that no outsider

had entered the house, police said.

Police allegedly recovered a large amount of cash from the boy's room. "During interrogation, the boy confessed on Tuesday evening that on the morning of 3 December, his mother asked him to go to school. When he refused, a dispute over money ensued, and his mother threw cash at him in frustration," Srivastava said. —PTI

Legal experts call for gender neutral legislation

Legal experts on Wednesday flagged the "gross misuse" of laws related to domestic violence and dowry harassment, while calling for a "correct filtration mechanism", new gender neutral legislations and sensitising the police to curb filing of false cases.

The experts were speaking in the aftermath of the alleged suicide by 34-year-old techie, Atul Subhash, leaving behind a 24-page purported death note, giving extensive details of what he alleged was years-long emotional distress of marital issues; multiple cases filed against him and harassment by his wife, her relatives, and a judge based in Uttar Pradesh.

Senior advocate Vikas Pahwa termed the issue as "very serious" requiring a fitting solution.

"For many years I have seen how the provision has been grossly being misused by many people. It's a very serious matter and we have to find a solution. My own personal view is that make this section bailable. Also, if there is false complaint is filed, action should be taken against the erring complainant. Also false cases of outraging the modesty being filed against in-laws. We see it every day. Courts should start taking these issues very seriously. Police should be sensitised. They should not facilitate filing such false cases," said Pahwa.

Supreme Court advocate Ashwani Dubey said there was a need for gender neutral laws.

"The whole premise of Section 498A is to protect women from being exploit-

behind women friendly laws was to safeguard the rights and wellbeing of women "who are considered to be the vulnerable section of the society".

"The purpose of these laws is to protect women from the atrocities caused due to family discord, domestic violence and financial hardships. However, it cannot be refuted that some women are misusing these laws to harass men and their family members to gain leverage in divorce proceedings, extort money and settle scores with them," Verma said.

She said the problem was not with the women protection laws, but their misuse, which can be prevented by a correct filtration mechanism in place in our legal and administrative environment.

"Before beginning a trial or investigation the veracity of the allegations must be verified," she said. —PTI

Migrant workers flee Lebanon after abuse & war

Isatta Bah wakes up from a nap in a crowded shelter on the outskirts of Beirut, clutching her baby, Blessing.

The 24-year-old from Sierra Leone spends her days waiting for an exit visa that could put her and her 1-year-old on a plane back to the West African nation. She wants to reunite with her family after what she called exploitative work conditions and sexual violence, along with the recent horrors of war in Lebanon.

"My experience in Lebanon is not good for me. I am really tired," Bah said. "I want to go home."

Hundreds of migrant workers in Lebanon are waiting to be repatriated after the ceasefire ending the 14-month war between the Lebanon-based Hezbollah and Israel went into effect last month.

Lebanon has long drawn migrant workers dreaming of building better lives for their families. Enticed by promises of stable jobs and decent pay, they enter Lebanon via recruitment agencies under a sponsorship-based labour system known as Kafala — only to find themselves often trapped with confiscated passports, long hours, withheld wages and, for many, abuse.

The Kafala system has long been criticised by human rights groups, but the government rarely if ever addresses the criticism. But Bah knew little of that when she came to Lebanon in 2022. She was promised a job at a supermarket with a USD200 monthly salary, she said. Instead, she was sent to care for an older woman once she arrived.

Within a month of her arrival, her 3-year-old son back home fell ill and died. She said she was not given the time to grieve and fled her employer's house. Since her employer held her passport and other documents, Bah said she had to leave them behind.

Her experience in Lebanon then took a darker turn. One day she and five housemates were picked up by a taxi driver who said he would take them home. Instead, she said, the driver dropped them at the

wrong spot. As they tried and failed to find another cab, a group of men chased them and raped them. "Men were coming and they were cheering for us," said Bah, who gave her consent to be named. "They beat us and they had sex with us." She said it took her about two weeks to recover and resume work at two hotels. Without documents, migrants can hesitate to go to police. Two months later, she and another friend found out they were pregnant. With war, their lives became more precarious. When Israel intensified its bombardment of Beirut's southern suburbs in September, Bah fled the area with her baby and friends on foot. Not every migrant worker escaped the attacks. An estimated 37 have been killed and 150 wounded since October 2023, said Joelle Mhanna with the UN's International Organization for Migration (IOM). To house over 200

women from Sierra Leone including Bah, they repurposed an abandoned space owned by her family — a former car dealership that was later a venue for pop-up events and named The Shelter. While some migrants have been accepted at government-run shelters, there were regular reports of others being evicted or denied access, the IOM said.

Some migrants hesitate to approach the government shelters for fear of detention or deportation, Mhanna said. "As a result, most are being hosted by embassies, NGOs and community-based organizations including churches, monasteries and other religious groups."

IOM said it has received requests from around 10,000 migrants seeking to be repatriated, a small fraction of the over 175,000 in Lebanon.

As of 26 November, the IOM had supported over 400 migrants to return home. That

included two charter flights for people from Bangladesh and Sierra Leone. It wasn't clear how many more flights are planned, or to where.

Laughter and cheer filled Beirut-Rafic Hariri International Airport on 19 November. The women from Sierra Leone arrived in groups, dragging suitcases and sharing hugs. Some danced in celebration for their long-awaited flight. "It wasn't easy," said Amanata Thullah after four years. "I am happy to be going back to my country." Bah was not among those leaving, but she said she and others at the shelter were happy to see friends return home.

She now awaits her turn, along with over 50 others.

"I wish to go back home to continue my education," Bah said. "Since I was little, I always wanted to be a computer science student, because I'm good at that." —PTI

Artificial solar eclipse: Why are satellites trying to block the sun?

When you see a solar eclipse, you often think of the moon passing between the Earth and the sun, then temporarily blocking the sun's light from reaching Earth. This alignment is known as syzygy (sounds like siz-uh-jee).

However, last week, the European Space Agency (ESA) launched two spacecraft that will aim to mimic the behaviour of the moon by creating an artificial solar eclipse for the first time ever. The idea? To demonstrate the readiness of a technology called precise formation flying (PFF) and to study the sun's atmosphere, known as the corona. The mission is called Proba-3 (Project for On-Board Autonomy).

"Right now this (the corona) is a poorly investigated, and scientists nowadays don't really understand some of the phenomenon that's happening there," Ester Bastida, Proba-3 systems engineer, said in a recent ESA video. Among the key questions about the corona that scientists want to understand is why it's significantly hotter than the sun itself.

While the surface of the sun is at roughly 5,500 degrees Celsius (9,932 degrees Fahrenheit), the corona — the wispy outer atmosphere of the

sun — can reach temperatures of 1-3 million degrees Celsius (1.8-5.4 million degrees Fahrenheit).

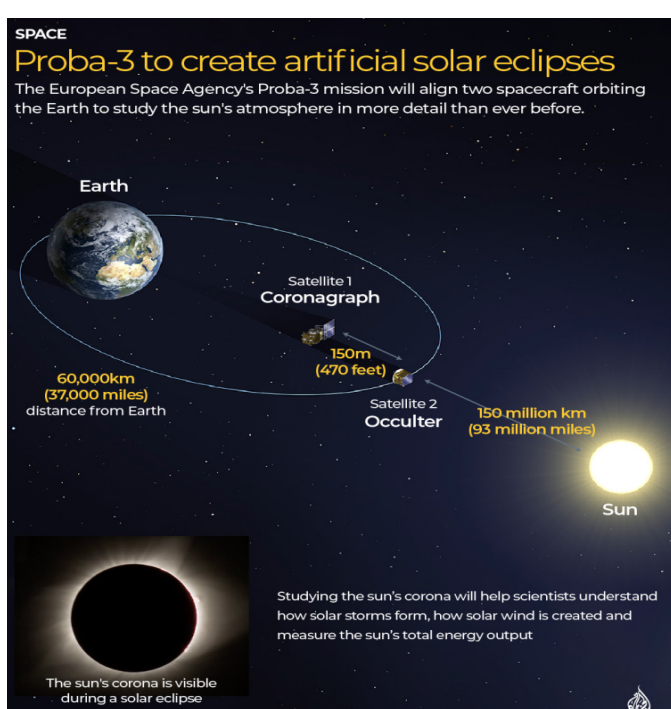
Although the circumference of the sun is roughly 4,373,000 kilometres (2,717,000 miles), solar flares from the corona can reach Earth, almost 150 million kilometres (93 million miles) away.

How does the Proba-3 create an eclipse?

The Proba-3 launched on December 5 at the Satish Dhawan Space Centre in India, one of the world's most-used space launch facilities.

The two spacecraft satellites will be carried into space roughly 60,000km above Earth using the PSLV-C59 rocket, built by the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO). The Coronagraph Spacecraft (CSC) is responsible for guiding the Occulter (OSC), the second spacecraft that has a disk with a diameter of 140cm (55 inches), which will cast a controlled shadow onto the Coronagraph spacecraft.

According to the ESA, the two spacecraft will use precise formation flying (PFF) technology to position themselves exactly 150 metres apart, lining up with the sun "so that one spacecraft blocks out the brilliant solar disk for the other".

The solar eclipse manoeuvre will need to have millimetre-level accuracy to succeed, creating a solar eclipse on demand for up to six hours so researchers can study the solar corona.

What are researchers hoping to accomplish during this mission?

One of the goals is to demonstrate the PFF technology, which uses GPS and inter-satellite radio links for initial positioning, while maintaining a precise distance between



both the Coronagraph spacecraft and the Occulter spacecraft.

Initially, the two satellite spacecraft remain connected. But once separated, they can maintain formation — they will then be 25-250m (82-820

feet) apart.

The second goal is to use the built-in equipment that will observe the corona to understand why the corona is hotter than the sun.

One of the instruments on board is a coronagraph — a

telescopic device that helps block out light from a star or other very bright object so other things can be seen. The Proba-3 coronagraph has a long-winded name: Association of Spacecraft for Polarimetric and Imaging Investigation of the Corona of the Sun (ASPICCS).

Why is this such a big deal? The corona typically remains invisible due to its extremely low brightness, appearing a million times lighter than the sun's bright surface. It only becomes visible to the naked eye during solar eclipses, when the moon blocks the sun's intense light.

"By studying the sun corona, we can better predict space weather and extreme geomagnetic storms, which can cause major disruptions to satellites and systems on Earth," the ESA said in a recent video on the mission.

Total solar eclipses are very rare — any spot on the Earth typically sees one only every 375 years, and they only last a few minutes.

If Proba-3, which has a 19-hour and 36-minute orbit, succeeds in its mission, scientists won't need to wait.

They will be able to study the corona for six hours in every orbital cycle of the mission. —Al Jazeera

CIA analyst accused of Israel-Iran leak to remain in jail

ALEXANDRIA, 12 DEC
A CIA analyst charged with leaking top-secret details ahead of a planned Israeli attack on Iran earlier this year will remain jailed pending trial, a judge said. The ruling by US District Judge Patricia Tolliver Giles overrules a magistrate who that Asif Rahman, 34, of Virginia, could be free on restrictions while he awaits trial on charges of disclosing national defence information. The fight over Rahman's detention revealed additional details about the government's investigation of the leak and the analyst who allegedly disclosed the classified documents in October on the Telegram. —PTI



NZ overturns visa denial for Candace Owens

WELLINGTON, 12 DEC
A New Zealand immigration official has overturned a ban on US conservative commentator Candace Owens, citing the "importance of free speech." Owens plans to speak at events in Auckland and several Australian cities in February and March. In October, Australia's Immigration Minister Tony Burke denied her entry, highlighting her controversial remarks regarding Nazi medical experimentation on Jews during World War II. Owens, who has over 3 million YouTube followers, has faced accusations of promoting conspiracy theories and antisemitism while opposing movements like Black Lives Matter. New Zealand initially refused her entertainer's work permit in November due to her exclusion from Australia. However, Associate Immigration Minister Chris Penk granted her a visa after considering the appeal. —PTI

Hong Kong ex-lawmaker convicted for rioting

HONG KONG, 12 DEC
A Hong Kong judge on Thursday convicted a pro-democracy former lawmaker of rioting during mob violence at a subway station at the height of the city's anti-government protests in July 2019. Prosecutors accused Lam Cheuk-ting of provoking a group of about 100 men armed with wooden poles and metal rods who attacked protesters and bystanders at a train station. The men, all clad in white shirts, in contrast with the black worn by protesters, claimed to be protecting their homeland in Yuen Long, a residential district in Hong Kong's New Territories. Dozens of people, including Lam, were injured in the violence, a key chapter that escalated the protest movement as the public criticised police for their delayed response. —PTI

Politico names Meloni Europe's powerful leader

ROME, 12 DEC
Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni has been named the most powerful person in Europe for 2024 by Politico, reflecting her growing influence. Leading the right-wing Brothers of Italy party, Meloni has transformed her image from ultranationalist to a respected leader recognized by both Brussels and Washington. Her leadership, balancing nationalist principles with pragmatic governance, has resulted in one of Italy's most stable governments in recent history. Policies on migration and LGBTQ+ rights, once controversial, now garner cautious approval within the EU. Meloni's rise also marks a broader European trend of right-wing populism challenging centrist politics. She has steered her party towards the centre, cementing her status as a formidable political force. —Agencies

UN demands 'immediate' ceasefire in Gaza

Israeli airstrikes kill 28 in Gaza, including 7 children and one woman after UN's ceasefire demand

BRISSELS, 12 DEC

The United Nations General Assembly has voted overwhelmingly to demand an immediate ceasefire in the Gaza Strip and expressed support for the work of the UN's agency for Palestinian refugees (UNRWA). The assembly on Wednesday passed a resolution demanding an immediate, unconditional and permanent ceasefire in Gaza, which was adopted with 158 votes in favour from the 193-member assembly and nine votes against with 13 abstentions. A second resolution expressing support for UNRWA and deploring a new Israeli law that would ban the UN agency's operations in Israel was carried with 159 votes in favour, nine against and 11 abstentions. That resolution demands that Israel respect UNRWA's mandate and calls on the Israeli government "to abide by its international obligations, respect the privileges and immunities of UNRWA and uphold its responsibility to allow and facilitate full, rapid, safe and unhindered humanitarian assistance in all its forms into and throughout the entire Gaza Strip".

Both votes culminated two days of speeches at the UN where speaker after speaker called for an end to Israel's 14-month war on the Palestinian territory that has killed at least 44,805 people — mostly Palestinian women and children — and wounded 106,257. "Gaza doesn't exist anymore," Slovenia's UN Ambassador Samuel Zbogor told the General Assembly meeting. "It is destroyed. Civilians are facing hunger, despair and death," he said. Al Jazeera Palestinian medical officials say Israeli airstrikes have killed at least 28 people in the Gaza Strip, including seven children and a woman, hours after the UN General Assembly overwhelmingly approved a resolution demanding an immediate ceasefire in Gaza. One of the strikes overnight and into Thursday flattened a house in the built-up Nuseirat refugee camp, according to the Al-Aqsa Martyrs Hospital in the nearby city of Deir al-Balah, where the casualties were taken. Two other strikes killed 15 men who were part of local committees established to secure aid convoys. —PTI

Russia edges closer to key Ukraine city

KYIV, 12 DEC

Fighting around the key eastern Ukraine city of Pokrovsk is "extremely intense" after a monthslong Russian push, Ukraine's top military commander said, with analysts estimating Russian forces are now within just a few kilometres of the city. Ukrainian troops repelled nearly 40 Russian attempts to storm defences around Pokrovsk over the previous 24 hours, the General Staff said in a battlefield report on Thursday. "Russian occupiers are throwing all available forces forward, attempting to break through the defences of our troops," Ukrainian army chief Gen. Oleksandr Syrskyi said in a Facebook post late Wednesday. His forces are outnumbered, he said. Ukraine's stretched defences in Donetsk have been creaking since early this year under a fierce Russian drive to capture its neighbour's entire eastern Donbas region. Russia is trying to overwhelm Ukraine's battlefield defences with sheer numbers of troops. Pokrovsk, which had a population of about 60,000 before Russia's invasion in February 2022, is one of Ukraine's main defensive strongholds and a key logistics hub in the Donetsk region. Indian student killed in UK road accident

LONDON, 12 DEC

A 32-year-old Indian student, Chiranjeevi Panguluri, has tragically died in a road accident in Leicestershire, eastern England, while four other passengers suffered serious injuries. The incident occurred on Tuesday morning, when the grey Mazda 3 Tamura, in which Panguluri was a passenger, veered off the A6 road and landed in a ditch. Emergency services pronounced Panguluri dead at the scene. The driver and three other passengers — one woman and two men — were taken to hospital, with two of the male passengers reported to have serious, but non-life-threatening injuries. A 27-year-old man has been arrested on suspicion of causing death by dangerous driving but has since been released on bail. All those involved in the crash are believed to be from Andhra Pradesh, India. —PTI

OVER MARTIAL LAW ROW S Korea Oppn moves to impeach Yoon

SEOUL, 12 DEC

South Korea's parliament says the country's six opposition parties have submitted a new joint motion to impeach President Yoon Suk Yeol over his declaration of martial law. The National Assembly said the main opposition Democratic Party and five smaller opposition parties submitted the impeachment motion on Thursday afternoon. The parties say they aim put the motion to a floor vote on Saturday. Yoon's short-lived 3 December martial law declaration has triggered political chaos and large protests calling for his ouster. The Democratic Party has argued that Yoon's decree amounted to rebellion. Earlier Thursday, Yoon defended his decree as an act of governance and denied rebellion charges. South Korea's National Assembly voted to impeach the national police chief and the justice minister over their enforcement of martial law last week. Yoon in a televised statement defended his martial law decree as an act of governance and denied rebellion charges. In a televised speech Thursday, Yoon, a conservative, said he enacted martial law as a warning to the liberal Democratic Party. He called the party "a monster" and "anti-state forces" that he said tried to use its legislative muscle to impeach top officials, undermined the government's budget bill for next year and sympathised with North Korea. Yoon said martial law was an act of governance that cannot be the subject of investigations and doesn't amount to rebellion. He said the deployment of 300 soldiers was designed to maintain order, not dissolve. —PTI

IS attack: Tight security for Taliban minister's funeral

KABUL, 12 DEC

Tight security measures were in place on Thursday for a Taliban minister's funeral in Afghanistan after he was killed in a suicide bombing claimed by an affiliate of the Islamic State group. Cabinet member Khalil Haqqani was the most high-profile casualty of an assault in the country since the Taliban seized power three years ago. He died in a blast, Wednesday at the Ministry for Refugees and Repatriation in the capital, Kabul, along with several other victims. Officials have not given the latest toll for the dead and injured. Haqqani is the uncle of Sirajuddin Haqqani, the acting interior minister and the leader of a powerful faction within the Taliban. The US placed a bounty on both their heads. In a statement carried by the Amaq News Agency, the IS affiliate said one of its fighters carried out the suicide bombing. The fighter waited for Haqqani to leave his office and then detonated his device, according to the statement. —PTI

Serbia's Prez says he won't flee country like Assad

BELGRADE, 12 DEC

Serbia's president accused foreign intelligence services on Tuesday of trying to unseat him in the wake of spreading protests in the Balkan state and that he wouldn't flee the country like the ousted Syrian leader Bashar Assad. President Aleksandar Vucic posted a video message on Instagram saying: "I will fight for Serbia and serve only my Serbian people and all other citizens of Serbia. I will never serve foreigners, those who seek to defeat, humiliate, and destroy Serbia," he added. Opponents of the populist leader compared him to Assad who fled to Moscow following a stunning rebel advance, ending his family's half-century of iron rule. Vucic's opponents in Serbia have compared him to Assad and other world dictators, predicting that he may also try to flee the country if he loses his

firm grip on power amid the protests triggered by a rail station roof collapse in the northern city of Novi Sad that killed 15 people on 1 November. The protesters in Novi Sad, Belgrade and other Serbian cities have blaming the deadly collapse on rampant corruption in the country that led to sloppy renovation work on the station building in Novi Sad — part of a wider deal with Chinese state companies involved in a number of infrastructure projects in the Balkan country. —PTI

Trump invites Xi to his inauguration: Reports

WASHINGTON DC, 12 DEC

President-elect Donald Trump has invited Chinese President Xi Jinping to his 20 January inauguration, CBS News reported, citing multiple sources. The invitation, extended shortly after the 5 November election, marks an unprecedented move, as no Chinese leader has ever attended a U.S. presidential inauguration. It remains unclear if Xi has accepted the invitation. In a recent NBC interview, Trump described his relationship with Xi as positive, revealing they had communicated as recently as last week. Despite the outreach, Trump's administration is shaping up to be tough on China, with several China hawks, including Senator Marco Rubio as secretary of state, slated for key roles. During his campaign, Trump vowed to impose a 10 per cent tariff on Chinese goods unless Beijing acts to curb fentanyl trafficking. He also floated tariffs exceeding 60 per cent, prompting warnings from Chinese state media about a potential tariff war between the two glob-

Australia to tax tech giants over content fee

AUSTRALIA, 12 DEC

Australia's government has unveiled plans to impose a tax on major tech firms if they fail to financially support local news media organisations. Effective from 1 January, 2025, this measure targets companies like Meta and Google with Australian revenues exceeding 250 million Australian dollars (£138 million) and requires them to pay for the news content driving traffic to their sites. Failure to comply will result in significant tax penalties. Communications Minister Michelle Rowland announced the initiative, highlighting the disruption caused by digital platforms to the media landscape, which poses a threat to the sustainability of public interest journalism. "These platforms need to support access to quality journalism that informs and strengthens our democracy," she stated during the announcement. The new regulations aim to bolster traditional media outlets facing challenges as their content is made universally accessible on online plat-

forms, leading to a severe reduction in advertising revenue. This shift has resulted in substantial job losses among Australian journalists. 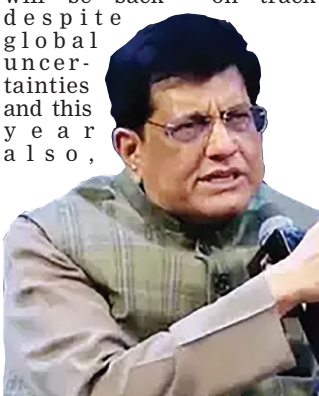

The government on Thursday sought Parliament's nod for additional net cash spending of Rs 44,143 crore in the current fiscal.

The first batch of Supplementary Demands for Grants for 2024-25 was tabled in the Lok Sabha by Minister of State for Finance Pankaj Chaudhary to seek approval of Parliament to authorise gross additional expenditure of Rs 87,762.56 crore.

Of this, the proposals involving net cash outgo aggregate to Rs 44,142.87 crore and gross additional expenditure, matched by savings of the Ministries/ Departments or enhanced receipts/recoveries, aggregates to Rs 43,618.43 crore.

This includes approval for spending Rs 6,593.73 crore towards the fertiliser subsidy scheme. The additional spending includes Rs 6,593.73 crore towards the fertiliser subsidy scheme, about Rs 9,000 crore for agriculture and farmer welfare, and Rs 8,000 crore towards defence spendings. It also includes expenditure of Rs 3,000 crore towards expenditure by the Ministry of External Affairs and Rs 4,800 crore towards expenditure by Home Ministry. —PTI

EDIBLE OIL IMPORT UP 39% IN NOV: SEA

NEW DELHI, 12 DEC

India's edible oil import rose 38.5 per cent to 15.9 lakh tonne in November mainly due to sharp jump in shipments of crude sunflower oil and crude soyabean oil, according to industry data.

On Thursday, Solvent Extractors' Association of India (SEA) released the data of import of vegetable oil (edible and non-edible) for November.

As per the data, import of vegetable oils during November, the first month of the 2024-25 oil marketing year, rose 40 per cent to 16,27,642 tonne compared to 11,60,590 tonne a year ago.

Out of total vegetable oil import, India imported 15,90,301 tonne of edible oil in November as against 11,48,092 tonne in the same month last year. Import of non-edible oils increased to 37,341 tonne compared to 12,498 tonne in November 2023.

Oil marketing year runs from November to October. In edible oil category, the import of RBD palmolein during November 2024 increased to 2,84,537 tonne compared to 1,71,069 tonne in the year-ago period. —PTI

It was 10.87 per cent in October and 8.70 per cent in November 2023. The CPI-based headline inflation increased from an average of 3.6 per cent during July-August to 5.5 per cent in September and further to 6.2 per cent in October 2024. —PTI

India needs \$2.2T investment to be a \$7T economy

India will require an investment of USD 2.2trn for infrastructure development to become USD 7trn economy by 2030, Real estate consultant Knight Frank India (KFI) said on Thursday, while stressing on the need of radical measures to encourage private participation in this area.

In its report, India Infrastructure: Reviving Private Investments, the KFI mentioned that "an estimated investment of USD 2.2trn into infrastructure development is imperative to support India's GDP size to expand to USD 7trn by 2030."

To achieve an economic size of USD 7trn by 2030, India's economy is required to grow at a CAGR of 10.1 per cent between 2024 and 2030, it added. KFI CMD Shishir Bajjal said, "Strong impetus on infrastructural development and increased budgetary allocation by government has led to India's ranking in the Logistics Performance Index improve from 54 in 2014 to 38 in 2023."

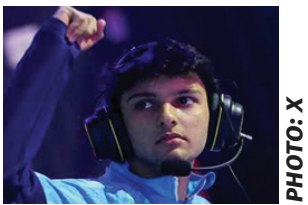


India is a big contender for WC: De Sloover

TN's Velammal Vidyalaya ready to welcome Gukesh

It's Velammal's shiniest moment, which trains budding players

Chennai, 12 DEC

The Velammal Vidyalaya at Mogappair in the western suburbs of the city slipped into a celebratory mood on Thursday evening, as D Gukesh, now the most famous name in the school muster, scripted history, becoming the youngest ever chess world champion. Gukesh outwitted Ding Liren 7.5-6.5 to unseat the Chinese from the highest seat in world chess.

It's the shiniest moment in the long history of the Velammal Institutions, the catalysing force behind the chess revolution in the city. While Gukesh and R Praggnanandhaa remain the brightest prodigies, the school offers expert training to hundreds of budding chess players.

"Chess has always been a part of the city's culture and the decision to make chess a part of the curriculum has helped it to boom. Of course, they also have a champion like Anand to look up to," S Velavan, the chess co-coordinator at the Velammal, said.

"Since most of the children coming here have a genuine interest in chess, we don't have to push them. They com-

bine studies and chess well, and the students who play chess have done even better in their studies," Velavan added.

What he refers to here is the '7 to 17 program' introduced in schools by former Tamil Nadu Chief Minister J Jayalalithaa in 2013, coinciding with that year's World Chess Championship between Viswanathan Anand and Magnus Carlsen which was held in the city.

Their dedicated approach has produced matching results too as Velammal Institutions won the World School Chess Championship for five successive years and both Gukesh and Praggnanandhaa were part of their squad in 2021.

It's not surprising then to see that several Grandmasters have come out of this school since 2005 - SP Sethuraman, Leon Mendonca, K

Priyadarshan, B Adhiban, Vishnu Prasanna, Visakh NR, Vignesh NR, M Karthikeyan, C Aravindh, Karthik Venkataraman, V Pranav, S Bharath, Arjun Kalyan, P Karthikeyan, N Srinath.
