This includes Chief Minister Siddaramaiah and **Deputy Chief Minister** Shivakumar, along with 32 other ministers. Shivakumar also said that the matter had not been discussed with Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge.

"During the Kharif season, crops were destroyed in about 77,000 hectares of land. In some areas, houses collapsed, and there were incidents of loss of life. Rs 162 crore has already been deposited in the accounts of the affected farmers as compensation,' Gowda added. –PTI

NEW DELHI, 29 NOV

India's economic growth has slowed to a near two-year low of 5.4 per cent in the July-September quarter of the cur-rent fiscal year, primarily due to underperformance in the manufacturing and mining sectors and weaker consumer spending. Despite this downturn, India remains the fastest-growing major economy globally, as China reported a

during the same period. The latest figures from the National Statistical Office (NSO) indicate a stark con-trast to previous quarters, with GDP expanding by 8.1 per cent in the corresponding quarter last year and 6.7 per

23 financial year. Private final consumption expenditure (PFCE), a key indicator of consumer spending, also decelerated, dropping to 6 per cent in the September quarter from 7.4 per cent in

The agricultural sector's gross value added (GVA) increased to 3.5 per cent from 1.7 per cent a year earlier, while the construction sector saw a GVA growth of 7.7 per

cent, down from 13.6 per cent. However, manufacturing GVA slowed to a mere 2.2 per cent compared to a robust 14.3 per cent last year, and mining GVA registered only 0.01 per cent growth, contrasting with 11.1 per cent a year ago.

B'desh accuses India of 'double standards'

DHAKA, 29 NOV

The Bangladeshi interim government has accused India of "double standards" regarding the treatment of minority communities, following the arrest of Hindu leader Chinmoy Krishna Das on charges of sedition. Asif Nazrul, Law Affairs Adviser to the interim government, took to Facebook to express that India's concerns over Bangladesh's minority rights are unwarranted, citing ongoing violence against Muslims in India, which he described as receiving no remorse from Indian authorities.

Nazrul referenced a Voice of America Bangla survey indicating that 64.1 per cent of Bangladeshis believe the interim government offers better protection to minorities than the previous Awami League administration.

In response to criticisms from Indian media, Chief Adviser Muhammad Yunus's Press Secretary, Shafiqul Alam, urged journalists in Bangladesh to counter what he labelled an "industrial scale misinformation campaign" and stressed the importance of controlling the narrative surrounding Bangladesh's internal affairs Protests erupted at Dhaka University, where students called for resistance against alleged Indian interference in Bangladesh. —PTI

The Ministry of External Affairs confirmed on Friday allegations against Adani Group executives are a legal matter involving private entities and the US Department of Justice Spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal stated during a weekly press briefing that India believes established legal procedures will be followed in this case. Elephant dies from 'Anthrax'

MYSURU, 29 NOV

A female elephant has died under suspicious circumstances that suggest Anthrax at the Bandipur Tiger Reserve. The 30-year-old pachyderm was discovered deceased near Bachahalli in the Kundukere range of Bandipur in the Gundlupet taluk of Chamarajanagar district on

Thursday.
Forest department officials found the elephant late on indicative of Anthrax, including severe bloating and bleeding from various body parts. A postmortem examination was conducted the following day in the presence of senior offi-

Veterinarian Dr Mirza Wasim, who performed the autopsy, reported that the ele-



phant exhibited classic symptoms of Anthrax, such as blood oozing from its ears, mouth, and rectum, along with pro-nounced body bloating. Samples from the deceased animal have been sent to advanced veterinary laboratories for thorough examination to verify the presence of

Anthrax. As a precautionary measure, Dr Wasim recommended vac-cinations for cattle in surrounding villages near the forest. S Prabhakaran, the deputy conservator of forests and project director of Bandipur Γiger Reserve, indicated that they are collecting information regarding any other animal deaths linked to Anthrax in the area, which includes consulting with the department of animal and veterinary

Prabhakaran emphasised that while the initial signs point to Anthrax, conclusive confirmation will only come from laboratory results. The forest department is actively coordinating efforts to monitor cattle and livestock for potential Anthrax infections and will continue to share information regarding any suspected cases neighbouring communities.

Sidhu, wife sued for ₹850cr over cancer treatment claims

Cricketer-turned-politician Navjot Singh Sidhu and his wife, Navjot Kaur Sidhu, have been served a legal notice amounting to Rs 850 crore by Chhattisgarh Civil Society (CCS) after Sidhu's claims regarding his wife's cancer recovery. Sidhu stated in a press conference on November that his wife had been declared cancer-free in 40 days, thanking to a special diet plan, which included turmeric, neem leaves, and apple cider vinegar, alongside conventional treatment. He emphasised the combination of diet and medical treatments

in her recovery. The CCS deemed these statements misleading, warning that such claims could discourage cancer patients from seeking proper medical treatment. They accused Sidhu of



potentially endangering lives by promoting alternative treatments and demanded an apology from the couple. The civil society gave them seven days to provide evidence supporting the claims or face legal action. Sidhu clarified that the diet plan was used in consultation with doctors and meant to facilitate the treatment, not

replace it. He reiterated his respect for medical professionals, emphasising that all steps were taken collaboratively with doctors' guidance. —Agencies

Yatnal, supported by MLAs Ramesh Jarkiholi, BP Harish, and former lawmakers includ-ing Aravind Limbavali and Kumar Bangarappa, has been vocal against the state leader-

On Thursday, the Shiv Sena leader said Shinde was unlikely to accept the post of deputy ČM in the new government in Maharashtra.

"We will take a decision (on Maharashtra CM) in a day or two. We have held discussions, and the discussions will continue. You will get to know when we take a final decision," Shinde told reporters in Delhi after the meeting.

Many leaders in the Shiv Sena are asking Shinde to accept deputy CM's post if offered by the BJP. However, another section feels it wouldn't be right for him to accept No. 2 position after serving as CM for more than two-and-a-half years, the sources said. —PTI

A single bench of Justice Urmila Joshi-Phalke in the order passed on 27 November said even a prisoner is entitled to dignity, and delivering a child in prison may have consequences. The court ordered Soni to be released on a temporary bail for six months. The woman, Surbhi Soni, was arrested in April 2024 under the provisions of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act. At the time of her arrest, she was two months pregnant. "They have also promised to cover all costs associated with transferring the idol from London to India, ensuring that it can be returned to the temple for worship. This marks a significant step in the efforts to return stolen idols to their rightful places of ori-

MP girl gangraped in moving ambulance

Sister, brother-in-law accused of abetting crime

A 16-year-old girl was allegedly raped in a moving ambu-lance operated under '108' emergency service in Mauganj district of Madhya Pradesh a week ago. Two of the four accused in the case, including the driver, have been arrested they said.

The crime took place when girl was travelling in the ambulance along with her sister and brother-in-law on 22 November. None of them was a patient. Besides the trio, driver Virendra Chaturvedi and his associate Rajesh Kewat were inside the vehicle, said Deputy Inspector General (Rewa Range) Saket Pandey on Thursday.

Pandey said the ambulance driver was known to the minor, her sister and brotherin-law. En route, the girl's sister and her brother-in-law got down from the vehicle on the pretext of fetching water. Instead of waiting for the couple, the ambulance driver sped away, said the officer.

Later, Kewat raped the girl

in the moving vehicle while



it was passing through Sunsan village, the officer said. After keeping her hos-tage for the whole night, the duo dumped her on the roadside in the morning, the DIG said.On reaching home, the survivor narrated the ordeal to her mother, but did file a complaint for two days, fearing the incident would tarnish the family's image, Pandey said.

However, the victim's family filed a case on 25 November against four peo-

ple, Pandey said. He said the ambulance driver Chaturvedi and Kewat, the alleged rap-ist, were arrested on Wednesday. A hunt has been launched for the girl's sister and brother-in-law, who have been charged with abetting the crime, said the IPS offi-

ED nabs dad-son duo in ₹2,800-cr chit fund scam

NEW DELHI, 29 NOV

The Enforcement Directorate (ED) on Friday said it has arrested a father-son duo in Kolkata in an alleged Rs 2,800-crore chit fund scamlinked money laundering

A special Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) court sent Basudeb Bagchi and his son Avik Bagchi, promoters of Prayag Group of compa-nies, to 10 days of ED custody, the agency said, adding that premises of the duo, and some others in Kolkata and Mumbai were raided

on 26 November.
The duo is accused of defrauding the public by collecting deposits worth Rs 2,800 crore under "false" high-return schemes like monthly income schemes

(MIS), redeemable preference shares and club membership certificates. As of now, the ED said, Rs 1,900 crore remains "unpaid" to

The Prayag Group operated without authorisations from regulatory bodies like the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) and the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI).

The agency said funds collected from the investors were "layered" by the promoters by incorporating multiple entities and subsequently used for buying properties. "The ED will interrogate the accused to uncover the properties acquired using the defrauded finds. This extreme that the second funds. This action is part of the ED's efforts to trace assets linked to the scam," it said. -PTI

Unni also said that the driver had filed a case in a Motor Accident Claims Tribunal in Thrissur seeking compensation of Rs 1 crore, claiming that Balabhaskar was driving the car at the time of the accident. "We have engaged a lawyer to fight that case," he said. More than six years ago, on 25 September, 2018, while

returning to Thiruvananthapuram from Thrissur, Balabhaskar's car had rammed into a tree causing serious injuries to him and killing his baby daughter. Balabhaskar later succumbed to the injuries.

The case was handed over to the CBI on the family's plea after the police ruled it was a road accident.

Silkyara ops changed me, says tunneller Arnold Dix

't's going to be ok". Someone had to say it, recalls tunneller Arnold Dix. And he did. The message of hope was desperately needed that day last November when he reached Silkyara in Uttarakhand where 41 workers had already been trapped in a tunnel for a

There was little light at the end of the tunnel - metaphorically and literally. But his bold promise that the men inside the under-construction Silkyara Bend-Barkot tunnel would be safely rescued by Christmas instilled hope in the workers, their families, and virtually every Indian during those difficult days.

The mountains had literally collapsed on them on 12 November and they were rescued on 28 November, after almost 17 gruelling days. As the entire nation watched with bated breath, Dix became the face of the rescue mission.


"At Silkyara someone had to say, 'it's going to be ok'. Someone had to make every one believe that we can do this because otherwise it will end how it always ends. They would have been dead," the president of the International Tunnelling and Underground Space Association told PTI.

"Normally, I am involved in recovering the bodies and learning the lessons of what has gone wrong. Silkyara was different, somehow I could feel it was different and we could do it." Dix said.

One year after the miraculous feat, the Australia-based peration in India to mark the first anniversary of the mission, confessed that his assurance was more based on belief than his

technical expertise. The 60-year-old Australian was in Europe when he received a call from Indian officials informing him about how a portion of the under-construction 4.5km Silkyara Bend-Barkot tunnel in Uttarakhand had collapsed, trapping 41 workers.

Without delay, Dix, widely considered the world's leading

expert on underground tunnelling, set off on a journey covering more than 6,400 km, travelling from Ljubljana, Slovenia's capital, to Mumbai, Delhi and then to Dehradun where a helicopter was waiting to take him to the site high up in the Uttarakhand's Uttarkashi district.

By the time he arrived on 19 November, the trapped workers had already endured a week of deprivation and fear, aware that the mountain could

The original strategy for the multi-agency-led rescue mission was to use horizontal drilling, assisted by Dix, to evacuate the workers.

However, as the operation neared its conclusion, the previously prohibited manual "rat-hole" mining method was used after augers (a device that drills holes into the ground) struggled to penetrate nearly 60 metres of rock threatening to trap the work-

ers. "Around day 14 or 15, as we

all know, everything had broken. The auger was broken, it ripped itself out of the ground, the casing was ripped apart and the auger itself was in pieces. Things were looking pretty grim. But I still felt that we would be okay, as long as we can stay calm.

Eventually, the workers, under Dix's watchful eye, were extracted through a passage created by welded pipes that rescuers had previously pushed through the rock.

emergea, saie and uninjured, Dix was on cloud — or on the top of Himalayas — for delivering on his promise that the workers would be home before Christmas. He said his first point of call after he landed at ground zero was to the makeshift temple built by locals near the tunnel where he paid his respects to the deity.

As expected, he became an overnight celebrity after the rescue, with children in India dressing up as the friendly bearded Aussie for costume

competitions. Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese praised him for his outstanding work during the rescue operation.

"No one ever talks about the engineering people. So when I was told the PM has been saying nice things about me, I was worried that maybe I have had a mental breakdown or a rock has fallen on me. I think it was lovely that those congratulations came and that just highlights that we made the seemingly impossible pos sible," he said. Soldiers desert Ukraine army as war intensifies

the Ukrainian army of desperately needed manpower and crippling its battle plans at a crucial time in its war with Russia, which could put Kyiv at a clear disadvantage in future ceasefire talks.

Facing every imaginable shortage, tens of thousands of Ukrainian troops, tired and bereft, have walked away from combat and front-line positions to slide into anonymity, according to soldiers, lawyers and Ukrainian officials. Entire units have abandoned their posts, leaving defensive lines vulnerable and accelerating territorial losses, according to military commanders and soldiers.

Some take medical leave and never return, haunted by the traumas of war and demoralized by bleak prospects for victory. Others clash with commanders and refuse to carry out orders, sometimes in the middle of sometimes in the middle of firefights. "This problem is critical," said Oleksandr Kovalenko, a Kyiv-based military analyst. "This is the third year of war, and this problem will only grow." Although Moscow has also been dealing with desertions, Ukrainians going Absent without offigoing Absent without official leave (AWOL) have laid bare deeply rooted problems bedeviling their military and how Kyiv is managing the war, from the flawed mobilization drive to the overstretching and hol-lowing out of front-line units. It comes as the U.S. urges Ukraine to draft more troops, and allow for the conscription of those as young as 18.

"It is clear that now, frankly speaking, we have already squeezed the maxi-mum out of our people," said an officer with the 72nd

Brigade, who noted that desertion was one of the main reasons Ukraine lost the town of Vuhledar in October. More than 100,000 soldiers have been charged under Ukraine's desertion laws since Russia invaded in February 2022, according to the country's General Prosecutor's Office.

Nearly half have gone AWOL in the last year alone, after Kyiv launched an aggressive and controversial mobilization drive that government officials and military commanders concede has largely failed.

It's a staggeringly high number by any measure, as there were an estimated 3.00,000 Ukrainian soldiers engaged in combat before the mobilisation drive began. And the actual number of deserters may be much higher. One lawmak-er with knowledge of military matters estimated it could be as high as 200,000.

Many deserters don't return after being granted medical leave. Bone-tired by the constancy of war, they are psychologically and emotionally scarred. They feel guilt about being unable to summon the will to fight, anger over how the war effort is being led, and frustration that it seems unwinnable. Another deserter said he initially left his infantry unit with permission because he needed surgery. By the time his leave was up, he couldn't bring himself to return.

He still has nightmares about the comrades he saw get killed.
"The best way to explain it

is imagining you are sitting under incoming fire and from their (Russian) side, it's 50 shells coming toward you, while from our side, it's just one. Then you see how your friends are get-

ting torn to pieces, and you realize that any second, it can happen to you," he said.

Desertion has turned battle plans into sand that slips through military commanders' fingertips. Ukraine's military recorded a deficit of 4,000 troops on the front in September owing largely to deaths, injuries and desertions, according to a lawmaker. Most deserters were among recent recruits.

The head of one brigade's legal service who is in charge of processing desertion cases and forwarding them to law enforcement said he's had many of them. That is how Vuhledar, a hilltop town that Ukraine defended for two years, was lost in a matter of weeks in October, said the 72nd Brigade officer, who was among the very last to withdraw. Reinforcements were sent once Russia wised up to Ukraine's weakened position and attacked. But then the reinforcements also left, the officer said. Because of this, when one of the 72nd Brigade battalions with-drew, its members were gunned down because they didn't know no one was covering them, he said.

Still, the officer harbors no ill will toward deserters. Ukraine's General Staff said soldiers are given psychological support, but it didn't respond to emailed questions about the toll

desertions are having on

the battlefield. Once soldiers are charged, defending them is tricky, said two lawyers who take such cases. They focus on their clients' psychological

state when they left. "People cannot psychologically cope with the situation they are in, and they are not provided with psychological help," said attorney Tetyana Ivanova. —PTI

Struggle to rebuild a war-torn Lebanon is on amid truce talks

ceasefire to end the war Hezbollah went into effect, Lebanon woke up to the sound of celebratory gunfire instead of Israeli airstrikes and drones buzzing overhead.

It was a rare moment of respite for Lebanon, as bombs stopped falling after a year of war. Thousands of displaced people joyfully drove back to their towns and villages in southern and eastern Lebanon.

But the realisation of what lies ahead quickly sank in. Town after town in the south and east as well as parts of Beirut have been destroyed, entire border villages levelled to the ground, and thousands of buildings damaged. The World Bank estimates losses amounting to some USD 8.5 billion.

For the tiny and broken Mediterranean country, which has dealt with compounded calamities for over half a decade, the ceasefire deal has brought more questions than

Among them, who will foot the bill for rebuilding? Will Hezbollah fully remove its fighters and arsenals from the south, relocating north of the Litani River — and how will the Lebanese army ensure that it does so? And will Israel ultimately accept the militants being pushed back, battered but not destroyed?

Meanwhile, Lebanon's political paralysis between groups allied and opposed to Hezbollah has only worsened during the war — raising the possibility of instability that could rattle the ceasefire. Anger has grown among some over that they see as the Iran-backed group's decision to provoke another disastrous war with Israel.

During the 60-day first phase of the ceasefire deal, based on Security Council Resolution 1701, Hezbollah and Israeli forces are to withdraw from south Lebanon, and the Lebanese military is to step in.

The Lebanese troops are to ensure that Hezbollah dismantles its facilities and military positions and that it doesn't try to rebuild. That's a major point of tension, potentially putting the army in a dangerous confrontation with the more powerful militant group.

The army, largely funded by

the United States and other Western governments, is a rare point of unity in Lebanon's tense sectarian power-balancing political system. But it's always tried to avoid friction Hezbollah, which is backed by a large constituency Lebanon's Shiite Muslims.

With US support, Israel has given itself "almost total freedom to determine when it needs or wants to attack Lebanon again for whatever reason," said Matt Duss, executive vice president of The Center for International Policy, a Washington-based think tank.

Lebanon since late 2019 has been mired in a crippling financial crisis that pushed millions into poverty, destroyed its banking system, and limited the country to just a few hours of state electricity

Iran will begin enriching uranium with thousands of advanced centrifuges at its two main nuclear facilities at Fordo and Natanz, the United Nations' nuclear watchdog said Friday, further raising tensions over Tehran's programme as it enriches at near weap-ons-grade levels. The notice from the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) only mentioned Iran enriching uranium with new centrifuges to 5 per cent purity, far lower than the 60 per cent it currently does likely signaling that it still wants to negotiate with the West and the incoming administration of Presidentelect Donald Trump, Iran's mission to the UN did not

Jailed Kremlin critic gets new prison term

TALLINN, 29 NOV

Imprisoned Kremlin critic Alexei Gorinov was convicted again on Friday for opposing Russia's war in Ukraine and handed a three-year prison term. A swift, three-day trial against Gorinov, once a low-profile activist, underscored Moscow's intolerance of any dissenting voices. Gorinov, a 63-year-old former member of a Moscow municipal council, is already serving a seven-year prison term for public criticism of the fullscale invasion. Taking into account his previous conviction and sentence, a court in Russia's Vladimir region ordered him to serve a total of five years in a maximum-security prison, a facility with stricter conditions than the one he's currently in. Russia's independent news site Mediazona quoted Gorinov's lawyer as saying that it means he will spend a year more behind bars compared to his previous sentence. -PTI



China jails scribe for seven years on espionage charges

BEIJING, 29 NOV

A court in China has sentenced journalist Dong Yuyu to seven years in prison on spying charges, according to a statement from his family, who called it a "grave injustice". In its verdict on Friday, the Beijing No 2 Intermediate People's Court deemed the 62-year-old former editor of the Communist Party's **Guangming Daily guilty** based on prior meetings with senior Japanese diplomats, his family said. Police guarded the court with seven police cars parked nearby, asking journalists to leave The sentence based on "no evidence declares to the world the bankruptcy of the justice system in China" the family statement read. Press freedom advocates have called for Dong's

The Australian government has raised its inter-national student visa fee by 126 per cent, from AUD 710 to AUD 1,600, effective from 1 July 2024.

This increase, confirmed by India's Minister of State for External Affairs, Kirti Vardhan Singh, has caused financial concern for Indian students, who make up a significant por-tion of Australia's interna-tional student community. The hike comes amid global inflation and rising living costs, further straining students' budgets. Israeli military strikes killed at least 30 Palestinians overnight in the Gaza Strip, most of them in the Nuseirat camp at the center of the enclave, medics said on Friday after some tanks pulled back from an area they had raided.

Medics said they had recovered 19 bodies of Palestinians killed in the northern areas of Nuseirat, one of the enclave's eight long-standing refugee camps. Some tanks remained active

in the western area of the camp and the Palestinian Civil Emergency Service said teams were unable to respond to dis-tress calls from residents trapped inside their houses.

The rest were killed in the northern and southern areas of the Gaza Strip, medics added. There was no fresh statement by the Israeli military on Friday, but on Thursday it said its forces were continuing to "strike terror targets as part of the operational activity in the Gaza Strip". Meanwhile, the Israeli authorities released around 30

100 MISSING AFTER BOAT CAPSIZES IN NORTHERN NIGERIA

ABUJA, 29 NOV

At least 100 passengers, most of them women, were missing after a boat transporting them to a food market capsized along the River Niger in northern Nigeria, authorities said

Friday.

The boat was taking the passengers from Kogi state along the river to neighboring Niger early Friday morning when it capsized, Niger Emergency Mana Management Agency spokesman Ibrahim Audu told The Associated Press. At least eight people were confirmed dead at the scene while local divers were trying to rescue others. Authorities have not confirmed what caused the sinking. However, local media reported that the boat was carrying more than 200 passengers, suggesting it might have been overloaded. 3 dead, 80,000 displaced in Malaysian floods

KUALA LUMPUR, 29 NOV

Malaysia is preparing for potentially its worst flooding in a decade as devastating monsoon rains have already claimed three lives and displaced over 80,000 residents. National Disaster Command Centre reports that 84,597 individuals from more than 25,000 families across seven states have been evacuated to 488 temporary shelters. Kelantan, in the northeast, has been hardest hit, with approximately 56,029 evacuees, followed by Terengganu

The vote came after hours of debate — emotional at times — that touched on issues of ethics, grief, the law, faith, crime and money. Hundreds of people on both sides of the gathered outside

Parliament. Speeches from supporters included heart-wrenching sto-

ries about constituents and family members who suffered in the final months of their lives and dying people who committed suicide in secret because it is currently a crime for anyone to provide assistance. Those opposed spoke of the danger that vulnerable, elderly and disabled people could be coerced into opting for assisted dying to save money or relieve the burden on family members. Others called for the improvement of palliative care to ease suffering as an alternative.

It's the first time the House of Commons has had the opportunity to vote on legalising what some people call "assisted dying" but which others term as "assisted suicide" in nearly a decade - and it looks like it will be a close result. Other countries that have legalized assisted suicide include Australia, Belgium, Canada and parts of US. —*PTI*

Rupee crashes 13P to settle at record low of 84.60

MUMBAI, 29 NOV

The rupee plunged 13 paise to settle at a fresh all-time low of 84.60 against US dollar on Friday, dragged down by unabated foreign fund outflows even as weak domestic macroeconomic data jolted the overall sentiment. Champions Trophy: PCB sticks to No Hybrid Model

Int'l Cricket Council emergency meeting to be held today

DUBAI/KARACHI, 29 NOV

The emergency meeting of the International Cricket Council's executive board could not achieve a consensus the much-awaited Champions Trophy schedule and will reconvene on Saturday after Pakistan once again rejected the 'Hybrid' model of hosting the event.

The meeting was brief after Pakistan Cricket Board chief Mohsin Naqvi made it clear that the 'hybrid' model won't be acceptable despite India's firm refusal to travel to his country owing to a lack of government clearance

'The Board did meet briefly today. All parties continue to work towards a positive resolution for the Champions Trophy 2025 and it is expected that the Board will reconvene on Saturday and continue to meet over the next few days,' a senior administrator of an ICC full member nation, who is also a part of the Board, told PTI. In Delhi, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) reiterated BCCI's stand that the Indian team cannot travel to Pakistan due to security rea-

sons.
"BCCI has issued a statement. They have said that

there are security concerns there and it is therefore unlikely that the team will be going there," an MEA spokesperson said in a routine briefing when the country's Champions Trophy participa-

tion was mentioned. PCB chairman Nagvi attended the meeting in person as he has been in Dubai since Thursday to push Pakistan's stance. BCCI secretary Jay Shah attended the meeting

online. Shah will take charge as the new ICC head on 1 December.

It is understood that the 'Hybrid Model' is being seen as the only "plausible solution" and if the tournament is adjourned, the PCB will have to forego their hosting fee of USD six million along with gate revenue.

There could also be a significant cut in their annual revenue, which is to the tune of USD 35 million.

Unless the 'Hybrid Model' is implemented, even the ICC will be in a spot of bother as official broadcaster Star would then renegotiate the multi-billion dollar deal with the body.

Gukesh and Liren draw 4th round game

SINGAPORE, 29 NOV

Indian Grandmaster D Gukesh and defending champion Ding Liren played out a mostly riskfree draw in the fourth round to remain level on points in World Championship battle here on

The two players signed peace after 42 moves via repetition and are tied on two points each after four games of the 14-round showdown. The first to reach 7.5 points will be crowned the champion. The 18-year-old Gukesh, who was playing with black on Friday, is the youngest-ever challenger for the title and won the third game on Wednesday."Towards the end,

I had some chances to press better but with black, this is all you can expect," Gukesh said after the game."I am just trying to make good moves,"

he added when asked about the prospect of becoming the youngest world champion. The 32-year-old Liren had

won the opening game before the two played out a draw in the second game."This round, I tried to play safe. It turns out I got a little bit of an advantage. The score is still balanced. There are more games to come," Liren said."I had a rest day to recover from the tough loss. I am in a very good mood. It worked well, not so bad," he added. With just 10 games remaining under the classical time control, Gukesh will have the advantage of playing white in the fifth game. On Friday, Liren started with the bird's opening trying to take out on the queen's bishop early in the opening which was a clear indication that the Chinese wanted to fight the Indians on skill rather than preparation.

Action and skill set make Bumrah a complete package: Steve Smith

MELBOURNE, 29 NOV

Star India pacer Jasprit Bumrah's unorthodox bowling action and exceptional skill set makes him a "complete package," according to Australia's premier batter Steve Smith.

Leading India in the absence of regular skipper Rohit Sharma, Bumrah was adjudged 'Player of the Match' after claiming eight wickets, including a five-wicket haul in the first innings, to power the visitors to a 295-run victory in the opening Test.

"From the start of his run-up, it's just all awkward," Smith told the Sydney Morning Herald.

"The way he runs is different to pretty much anyone else, then the last bit of his action is

different. I've faced him a reasonable amount now, and each time you face him it takes a few balls just to get the rhythm of it in a way.' Smith was among Bumrah's

victims during a devastating opening spell in the first innings, where the pacer tore through the Australian top-order. Former Pakistan skipper Wasim Akram explained how Bumrah's release point is at

least a foot closer to the batters than any other bowler making it that much difficult to pick the length.

"He releases the ball closer to you than any other bowler, just the way he does it. So maybe it rushes you a bit more than you think, and it's just an awkward action," said the 35-year-old Smith, who was trapped by Bumrah for a duck.





India look to make most of pink-ball warm-up

CANBERRA, 29 NOV

India would aim to figure out their batting combination for next week's day-night Test in Adelaide when they face Australia Prime Minister's XI in a two-day tour game at the Manuka Oval here from Saturday.India have played four day-night Tests thus far with their only loss coming at Adelaide four years ago when they were bowled out for 36 before making a winning comeback in the four-match Test series. The pink ball does a lot more compared to the red cherry, especially in the twilight period. Considering it is not a first-class game, the majority of the Indian batters would like

to get a feel of the ball in the middle. Coming from their most dominant win in Australia in the opening Test in Perth, the Indian dressing

room is in high spirits. However, the arrival of Rohit Sharma, who missed the first Test due to the birth of his second child, and the expected return of a fit-again Shubman Gill will force the think tank to rejig the batting order for the match beginning 6 December. Rohit and Yashasvi Jaiswal are the designated openers but with the latter and K L Rahul excelling at the top in Perth, there is a case for the Indian skipper to drop himself down the order.If that does happen, Gill's position will also need to be adjusted. India will have to make those calls in the practice game before reaching Adelaide with full clarity.

As it is only a two-day game. India would be hoping to get a lot more time with the bat than the ball. The likes of Sarfaraz Khan, who are unlikely to be considered unless there is an injury, would also be hoping for some game time.

The team is in a relaxed mood and had its first net session on Friday where Gill took guard, indicating that his recovery is well on course. India has been reluctant to play tour games as they are often not competitive enough.Match starts: 9.10 am IST. —PTI

CHRISTCHURCH, 29 NOV

You have to make hay while the sun shines, as Harry Brook proved in two distinct interpretations of that hackneyed adage. His seventh Test century and sixth away from home was a magnifi-cent and crucial contribu-tion to a day of wildly contrasting weather patterns, as England recovered from a torrid working over under overcast morning skies to

storm towards first-innings parity by the close, as the sun broke back through for

the day's final two sessions. But rarely can New Zealand have clouded their fortunes with a spate of fielding lapses to match those that they served up on this enthralling second day.

Six clear-cut chances went begging in the course of England's 319 for 5, including four for Brook alone - and at almost rhythmical interviews

too: on 18, 41, 70, and 106, as if designed to douse their bowlmorale any time they looked ready to turn back the

The upshot is a match situation that now feels like England's to blow. The sense after they'd prised out eight first-day wickets after choosing to bowl first was that this wicket would get better and better for batting, and so it

seemed to prove.

Brook himself built key stands of 151 for the fifth wicket with Ollie Pope, who responded to his wicketkeeping reshuffle with an excellent 77, and an unbeaten 97 with his captain, Ben Stokes, who was ominously placed on 37 from 76 at stumps.

Stokes did, however, get a life of his own on 30 in the day's closing overs, as Tom Latham spilled catch No.6, and his third of the day, this

time at short cover.
But England had not bargained for the mayhem that greeted them while the clouds were in situ for the first three

hours of play.
England 319 for 5 (Brook 132*, Pope 77) trail New Zealand 348 (Williamson 93, Phillips 58*, Carse 4-64, Bashir 4-69) by 29 runs.

McLaren, Red Bull fight for lucrative title

LUSAIL, 29 NOV

Max Verstappen won big in Las Vegas with his fourth title, but the fight for Formula 1's biggest cash prize is hotting up this week in Qatar. The lucrative constructors' championship is still wide open with McLaren, Ferrari, and Red Bull battling for the title. The contest for teams is worth around \$140 million to the winner, though the precise pay-out depends on variables. This weekend in Qatar, a sprint race on Saturday means extra points are on offer — a maximum of 59 for a team over the whole weekend.

McLaren leads by 24 points from Ferrari, with Verstappen's Red Bull 29 further back.

McLaren could seal its first constructors' crown since 1998 this Sunday, wrapping up the title ahead of the final round in Abu Dhabi next week, but would likely need either a perfect weekend or for Ferrari to encounter problems. McLaren's bid is the new focus for Lando Norris after his challenge for the drivers' title ended last week in Las Vegas. Norris on Thursday dismissed a reported claim from Verstappen that he could have won the crown earlier in a McLaren and suggested the Dutch driver try "comedy". He then suggested his own. "Red Bull probably would have won the constructors' (championship) if they had two drivers as good as Max, that's for sure," Norris said. The contributions of

Norris' teammate Oscar Piastri, who won the Qatar sprint race as a rookie last year, have been key to McLaren's hopes. Ferrari's Charles Leclerc and Carlos Sainz Jr. have been close on the track and sometimes too close for comfort all year.Red Bull's Sergio Perez is the only driver in the top three teams without a race win this year, he's eighth in the standings with less than half Verstappen's points total. Qualifying 16th and finishing 10th in Las Vegas was another disappointment.Perez, who has faced speculation over his future almost all year, says he's struggled to make the title-winning Red Bull car fit his driving style.
